Possibilities of developing Prince Edward Island trade with Labrador are being explored and arrangements are now under way to have a boat go up that coast starting from a port in Quebec, states Mr. W. E. Agnew, director of trade for the Province, in his annual report which was tabled in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources.

This department has been exploring the possibilities of trade with Labrador for some time and has been in touch with some of the firms doing business there at present," the report states. "A great deal of supplies go by water to Seven Islands and are flown in from there. Others are flown in direct by T. C. A. and the R. C. A. P."

A personal visit will be made in the near future to this territory to get first hand information and get acquainted with conditions, it is intimated.

Amendments to the Charlottetown Incorporation Act were given first reading in the Legislature yesterday, for the purpose of effecting the following changes in the existing statute: To prevent disqualification of a Mayor or Councillor who may, while holding such office, be elected to the Legislature of the Province; To require City taxes to be paid as at Dec. 31 to enable qualification of the taxpayer at the next general election; To ratify the City's authority to establish the civic employees' retirement scheme; To make unnecessary a by-election to fill a vacancy occurring before a general election; To enable the blocking off of the eastern extremities of Richmond and Sydney Streets.

Also given first reading was an amendment to authorize the Commissioner of Sewers and Water to issue \$12,000 sewer debentures and \$30,000 water debentures to take care of the bank overdraft due to the 1949 extensions in the Brighton area and to cover the expense of other recent and future extensions of water and sewer mains in the city.

The debentures are to be in denominations of \$500 and \$1,000, for twenty years, at an interest rate not exceeding 4 per cent.
