The Farmers' Guardian

Lessons for the Farmer.

When Prof. Shuttleworth lectured at Cavendish last January on commencing the growth and use of fodder corn he stated that a Mr. Miller of Marshfield grew ten acres of corn and would have enough ensilage to feed his herd of 18 cattle without any straw the whole winter through, thereby creating the impression that no other feed was required for the herd.

In his letter on dairy stock in the GUARDIAN of the 13th ult., he tells that Mr. Miller's fodder corn is all done, and that he is now feeding on steamed hay mangled turnips and oats and vetches which he had stored in another division of silo, and that he grew enough on his farm of 100 acres to feed 20 head of cattle and 18 horses. In conclusion he asks, Will the farmers take a lesson? Answer, Yes, a lesson which I fear they pay too dearly. When I read an account of the Cavendish lecture I thought there was surely a bright prospect before the farmers of P. E. Island, but when I read the letter on dairy stock the bright prospects all seemed to vanish instead of brightening. I therefore made inquiry, and learned that Mr. Miller's ensilage was all fed before or about the 1st of Feb., and that he bought in the vicinity of ten tons of bran, one ton of cake, and a quantity of oats, besides several tons of hay grown on part of the Connolly Estate in the County of Charlottetown. So much for the lesson.

I further learned there were two other parties, Messrs. R. Munn and Peter Robertson, in Marshfield who grew and siloed fodder corn, also Mr. Newman at Suffolk, and was given to understand from their experience that neither Messrs. Miller, Munn, or Robertson, would substitute the growth of fodder corn for turnips, though they were all growing on part of the Connolly Estate in the County of Charlottetown, and were full another year by planting an earlier maturing corn.

Perhaps the parties, who are all reliable, would favor the public with their experience, which would be a more reliable lesson to farmers.
