

# CONTRACT BRIDGE

right hand opponent deals three diamonds, both vulnerable. What do you now with each of the following hands?

1. AKQ96 VAJ82 45 AJ74  
2. AK8 VAJ8 45 K4 AKQ982  
3. AK83 WAQ96 45 AKQJ94  
4. 45 KQJ9863 44 AKQJ5

1. Double. The double of an opening three bid is primarily informative. It requests partner to bid, just as the double of a one bid requests partner to bid. The doubler, since he is competing in the nine trick level, must be reasonably prepared for any response partner may make. He should have values in excess of a minimum opening bid.

The responder sometimes transforms the informative double into a business double by passing. His hand may be such that he feels the best result will be obtained if the opponents play at three diamonds doubled. In such cases, he must have diamond length or strength.

2. Three notrump. There is nothing conventional about this bid. It simply expresses a desire to play three notrump. Naturally, this bid cannot be made unless there are substantial values.

With eight probable winners, assuming a diamond lead, the

best prospect for game lead lies in notrump. A four club overall would be incorrect since it loses the opportunity to play in the most promising contract. Partner is permitted to take out to a suit if his hand cannot stand notrump play, but such a decision should not be made lightly. He is not being asked to bid.

3. Four diamonds. Game is extremely likely in one of the three suits. The cue bid in diamonds serves many purposes. It alerts partner to the void in diamonds and a hand rich enough in high cards and distribution to force the partnership to game.

There is a clear implication that a slam is not far away. The responder is thus encouraged to attempt a slam when his hand has features which a minimum response would not show.

The cue bid also avoids the danger that partner might allow a double of three diamonds to stand.

4. Four hearts. The game in hearts should be undertaken at once. Partner needs very little for the game to be made. If he has either the ace of hearts or tricks of clubs, ten tricks are quite likely.

The skip to four hearts will also tend to impress partner that the suit is a good one. An overcall of three hearts, aside from the fact it doesn't do justice to the hand, may lead partner to undertake a spade contract, since he cannot be expected to know the hearts are practically self-sufficient.

## Red Journalist Visits U.K. Home

LEITCHWORTH, England (AP) — John Scott Peet, 41-year-old British journalist who defected to Communist East Germany in 1950, turned up here Saturday on a vacation trip.

He said he had done nothing "disloyal" to Britain and the West in his seven years' absence and intends to go back to his job in East Berlin. He now edits a sheet called German Report for the East German government.

Peet caused a sensation of the "Burgess and MacLean" order when, declaring he could "no longer serve the Anglo-American warmongers," he crossed into East Berlin, quitting his correspondent's post in the western sector without notice.

He arrived in England unheralded several days ago and is staying at his mother's home with his third wife, a Bulgarian he married in Berlin in 1952, and their 10-month-old daughter.

## Plan Regional Lay Retreat

## Sunk 29 Years Snapshots OK

PORT ARTHUR (CP)—Several snapshots buried in a sunken ship in Lake Superior for 29 years have been brought to the surface, almost as good as new.

The pictures were recovered by salvage diver Jack Coghlan, 22, from the Purser's cabin of the U. S. passenger ship America, which sank in 1928 after striking a reef near Isle Royale south of here. All passengers and crew were rescued.

The salvage diver recovered the snapshots, most of which belong to the assistant purser of the vessel, Fred S. Nelson of Duluth, Minn. He was aboard the America on her last trip.

The only explanation offered for the staying power of the submerged snapshots is that they were in "cold storage," in a drawer in the purser's cabin of the wreck.

## New Brunswick Renews Air War Against Budworm

FREDERICTON (CP)—Twenty aircraft, the vanguard of a 100-plane armada assembled to combat the dread budworm, were to arrive today on route to bush airstrips to which they have been assigned.

Remainder of the fleet will arrive in successive waves until June 4 when all are expected to be in position at 14 airfields in New Brunswick and eight in Quebec.

The budworm spraying operation, sixth in this province and fourth in Quebec, is the largest ever planned in this area. More than 5,000,000 acres in New Brunswick and 1,250,000 in Quebec Gaspe Peninsula will be sprayed.

The New Brunswick phase will cost an estimated \$3,500,000 which will be split evenly among the federal and provincial governments and the companies whose property will be treated.

Half the \$1,000,000 job in Quebec will be picked up by the provincial government and the other half by the companies.

**GOOD FOR YEAR**

Almost all the timberlands to be sprayed in New Brunswick have been treated previously in Quebec only 10 per cent of the area has been covered before.

The DDT spray is effective for one or two years after which the insects can safely return in sufficient numbers to threaten the forests. Spraying has succeeded in keeping alive most of the trees in the infested woods but in control areas left unsprayed for experimental purposes most of the balsam fir and spruce trees have been killed.

The 3,500,000 gallons of insecticide will be sprayed at the rate of one-half gallon an acre.

In addition to 190 spray aircraft, 25 service and inspection planes will be used. Canadian sources were unable to supply all necessary spray aircraft and 167 had to be found in the United States.

The inspection aircraft, all Canadian, already are surveying the area.

## Camping Helps Real Teaching

WINNIPEG (CP) — Ted Yard believes camping is one of the best ways for children to learn adjustment in the modern world.

The 38-year-old director of the YMCA Camp Pine Crest in Ontario was in Winnipeg recently to spread the gospel of organized camping.

Mr. Yard, president of the Ontario and the Canadian camping association, says:

"The public needs to know that good camp leaders aren't merely people who dish out three good meals daily. With new techniques, leaders are trained now to give understanding leadership."

He attended the Manitoba camping association's first camp in Quebec for the season at Caddy Lake.

About 50 camp leaders spent a weekend learning about water safety, watercraft skills and training techniques for staff.

"Counsellors rent just jobs at camp," Mr. Yard says. "Camp is a real opportunity for them to advance their own thinking."

"Experience gained at camp is a real asset for teaching, for social work, or any work in which one has to relate to others. More employers are recognizing this value all the time."

"And because of better techniques in camping, each youngster is getting better attention—not just from the counsellor, but from the supervisor helping the counsellor."

Mr. Yard has been a director at the Ontario's Pine Crest Camp for 15 years.
