FROM BERLIN 1945

Papers Show How Nazis Tried To Keep U.S. Neutral

WASHINGTON (AP)—Captured Second World War documents made public Wednesday report an American oilman made a \$250,000 payment to the Democrats in 1940 in a vain attempt to block President Franklin D. Roosevelt's re-nomination. The documents, dealing with Hitler's efforts to keep the United States out of the war, name such Americans as Charles A. Lindbergh, Henry Ford, Wendell Willkie, and radio commentator Fulton Lewis Jr. Hans Thomsen, then in charge of Nazi Germany's embassy in Washington, cabled Berlin regularly on the progress of his propaganda campaign to encourage American isolationist sentiment for neutrality. The German documents were taken from the German foreign ministry and Reich Chancellory archives by the allies when Berlin fell. They report, among other things: 1 That the late W R Davis, who at the time was dealing in various oil matters for the Mexican government, "paid \$250,000 to the national and Pennsylvania state Democratic organizations." It was reported that Davis "in February, 1940, acting through Walter A. Jones, paid about \$100,000 to the representative of the Pennsylvania Democratic organization for the purpose of (1) promoting the candidature of (words garbled) in opposition to the anti-German Senator Guffey; (2) buying the approximately 40 Pennsylvania delegates to vote against Roosevelt at the party convention in Chicago, to be held July 17." 2 That "Lindbergh's attitude is to wait and see whether Willkie will be able to avoid the bondage to Jewry" Further that "the circle about Lindbergh now tries to at least impede the fatal control of American policy by the Jews." Lindbergh was called "the most important of the forces opposing the Jewish element and the present policy of the United States." 3 That a group of "prominent business men and politicians" headed by "James Mooney of General Motors" favored urging Roosevelt to send an ambassador to Berlin (the post had been vacant in protest against Hitler's policies), assign a new ambassador to London, and suspend arms shipments to Britain pending fresh talks with the German government. Mooney was not otherwise identified, nor were any other names mentioned as belonging to such a group. 4 That the late Henry Ford "personally proposed to Thomsen that before Hitler attacked England he should publicly define his viewpoint and aims so as "to have a widespread effect on American public opinion" Mooney also was recorded as having made a similar suggestion. 5 That two points in the 1940 Republican party platform — expressing opposition to involvement in war and saying the Republicans stand for Americanism, preparedness and peace — "were taken almost verbatim" from ads in the New York Times of June 25 and other papers "which were published upon our instigation." 6 That Fulton Lewis Jr proposed that Hitler send short telegrams to Roosevelt urging the president to try to convince then British Prime Minister Winston Churchill it was senseless to fight against Hitler. Lewis labelled this "a pure fabrication." 7 That the Germans, in diplomatic contacts with the Japanese, suggested an attack on Hawaii and the Philippines by Japan "to keep America occupied in the Pacific area in case America should enter the war against Germany."



REV. DR. GEORGE M. YOUNG Former Minister To Speak At Trinity

Returning to the pulpit which he occupied over fifty years ago will be Rev. Dr. George M. Young who is a former pastor of Trinity Church in Charlottetown. Dr. Young has had a long and distinguished career in the Christian ministry. A native of Rexton, N. B. he was ordained in the Methodist ministry in 1904. He was in the move which culminated in the formation of the United Church of Canada. Although advanced in years, Dr. Young has lost little of the fire which has rated him as one of the foremost preachers of the Maritimes. At the present time he is writing his life story, several chapters of which have appeared in the "United Churchman". Dr. Young will preach at both services this coming Sunday.

Journalist From P. E. I. Is Now In Australia

A former Charlottetown man has been appointed public relations officer for the State Housing Commission of the government of Western Australia. He is William D. "Bill" DeCoste of Prince St., Charlottetown. Well known in Ontario newspaper circles, Mr. DeCoste was on the staff of the Timmins Press and Windsor Daily Star, before going to the Pacific with British United Press in 1954. He was educated at Queen Square School and the Corcoran Business Training College in Charlottetown and studied Journalism at the Stanford University school of Journalism in Palo Alto, California.
