HESS VERGES WHEAT.—The Northwest Pacific Farmer, of Portland, Oregon, says: One bushel of wheat, where good chickens are given the run of the farm, will produce ten dozen eggs. In many sections of the Northwest late sown grain did not make over ten bushels to the acre. In these same sections ten dozen eggs are now worth several bushels of wheat.

HAS KILLED FORTY-FIVE.—William Merry, of Inglesville, N. S., has shot and trapped 45 bears during his life, the last two have been trapped on the 6th and 7th days of the past month. Mr. Merry is in the impression that no other man living in the country has done as much towards depleting the forests of these troublesome and destructive animals as he has, and should anyone know of a better record he would like to hear of it.—Week's Monitor.

STEWART ARREST.—About a week ago a man named D. N. Stewart, of Detroit, leased a theatre in London, Ont., calling it "Wonderland," and employed a stock company headed by Charles Haystead and Jesse Mills (well known in Charlottetown) who gave a performance nightly. Stewart boarded his company at one of the best hotels, and as he had unlimited nerve and an apparently full purse he obtained unlimited credit from city merchants. The receipts for the week were about \$300. On Monday morning Stewart suddenly disappeared with all the funds, leaving the company's wages and board bill unsettled and a large number of bills unpaid. The players are almost penniless and are practically stranded. A warrant has been sworn out for Stewart's arrest and the police will search Detroit for him.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. MONTREAL, Dec. 11.—The Star's cables say: London, Dec. 11.—The Belgian officials at Antwerp report they have discovered the presence of pleuro-pneumonia among Canadian cattle which have been landed at that port from Montreal. The Canadian government officials here are sending a veterinary surgeon to Antwerp tonight to report whether the cattle affected are really Canadian cattle and whether it is pleuro-pneumonia from which the animals are suffering.

PEKING, Dec. 11.—The angry feeling of the Chinese population here against foreigners is increasing. A British resident in China who occupies an important position which brings him in touch with the Mandarin and the masses, says: "A tragedy may occur any day and when the Japanese come within sight of the capital. I feel certain every foreigner will be massacred. The foreign ministers will incur a perfectly in-vane risk if they remain there after the ice has closed the port of Tien Tsin. The grave danger is in the fact that nearly all the soldiers are members of secret societies which are ready to break out at the first chance."

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 10.—There was a remarkable wedding at the Kansas State penitentiary yesterday. The contracting parties were Arthur Winner and Miss Charlotte Moore. Winner was sentenced to life imprisonment 22 years ago for murder, arson and robbery. Charlotte Moore was convicted ten years ago as accessory to the murder of Major Johnson, of Junction City, Kansas. While in prison she and Winner fell in love. Winner was released last May and the woman in July. After that they corresponded, and finally agreed to be married in the penitentiary. Winner is now a travelling salesman for the shoe factory in connection with the prison.

AN AWKWARD PLACE. SIR,—The Recorder's conduct in giving his legal opinion on the legality of the Council in dismissing Walter Kinsman from the police force to the Guardian reporter, is open to grave comment. He is the confidential and legal adviser of the Mayor and Council, and is paid for giving his advice and opinion to that body when they apply to him and he should not so far forget himself and the duty he owes the corporation as to give his opinion for publication to outsiders—opinions which reflect on the Mayor and Council.
