**Speeding Machinery To Call Hurried Parliament Sessions**

OTTAWA, (CP)—The government is speeding up the machinery to call Parliament into session in a hurry, if the need arises.  
A special edition of the Canada Gazette Tuesday set the tentative date for Aug. 26, the same date announced in the regular edition of the Gazette last Saturday. This does not mean members will meet on that day, however.  
A government spokesman said that the one-page special edition can be issued on shorter notice than the regular edition, which require about five days advance notice.  
Prime Minister St. Laurent has said Parliament may be called if Canadian railway workers decide to go on strike.  
The tentative dates for the next session, noted in weekly pro forma proclamations in the Canada Gazette, have been set in successive issues for Aug. 5, Aug. 12, Aug. 19 and now Aug. 26.  
The spokesman said the weekly changes now will be made in special editions of the Gazette so that once a firm date for assembling Parliament has been decided, notice can be published more rapidly.

**Waste Slabs Turned Into Newsprint By Debarking Machine**

ATLANTA, Ga., (AP)—The lumber industry, taking a leaf from meat packers who use all but the pig's squeal, now is turning waste slabs into newsprint.  
A debarking machine, invented by Leon Clancy, president of Clancy Forest Productions, Inc., of Decatur, Ala., is the heart of the process. Spokesmen for the American Forest Products Industries here said Monday the operation promises wholesale recovery of pulpwood chips from slabs that have until now gone into burning slab piles at sawmills or been sold for fuel.  
The new machine removes all the bark from slabs and edgings by means of high pressure water jets. Three jets of water hit the slabs with a pressure of 900 pounds per square inch at an angle that strips off the bark. Slabs and edgings left from the manufacture of 1,000 board feet of lumber provide approximately one half-cord of pulpwood chips.

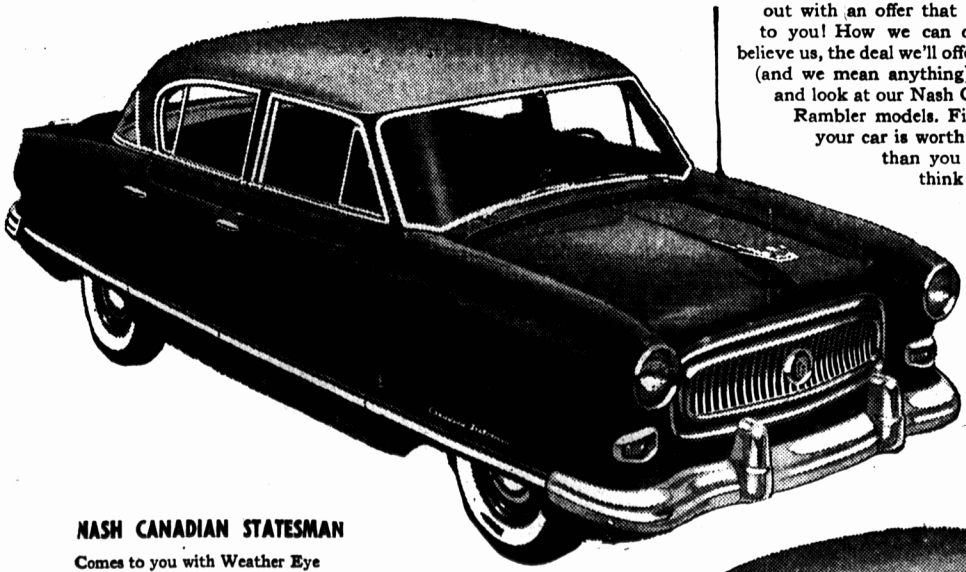

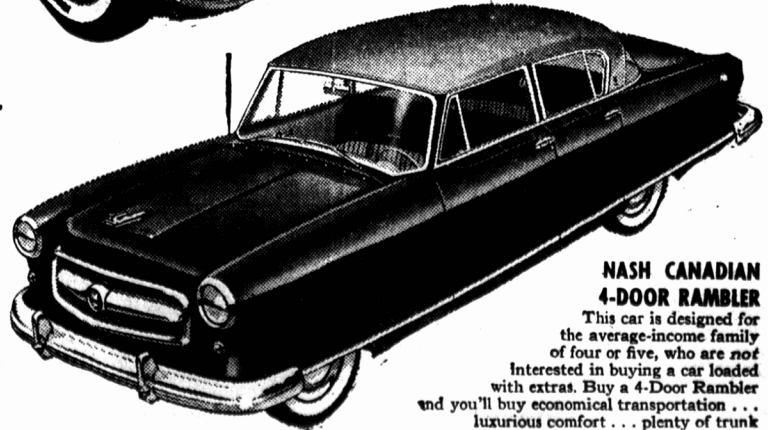
