Brown, of Summerside, purchased a standard bred bay mare for \$110; Owen Trainor, of this city, a black filly, by Administrator, for \$145; and Captain Nicholson, of the City Hotel, a bay mare, by Hernando, for \$65. W. W. Beer bought a Jersey cow for \$33. The remainder of the stock advertised was sold at private sale. The auction sale was conducted by Mr. Bearsto.

AN INTERESTING LECTURE.—On Monday evening in the basement of the Methodist Church a lecture, illustrated by magnificent lime light dissolving views will be delivered by the Rev. C. F. Cocking on the manners and customs of the Japanese. These views taken from life by the best Japanese artists cannot be surpassed, indeed, it is doubtful if there are any to equal. The lecturer is of the best make throwing a good 20 ft. picture. At the close the lecturer will appear in native costume, give an address in Japanese and exhibit a large number of articles used by the people in their daily life.

HAS A GOOD ONE.—The Administrator filly which Mr. Owen Trainor, of this city, bought yesterday at the sale of horses at Doyle's stables, is pronounced a beauty and a promising candidate for enrollment among her sire's already respectable list of 2.30 trotters. She is a two-year-old, compactly built and of good style, size and color. Up to the close of 1890, Administrator made a good showing as a sire of 2.30 speed, and also of producing daughters. This season, when the books are made up, will show further additions to his roll of honor. He sired the dam of Rosemary, a two-year-old filly, owned by the celebrated breeder, B. J. Treacy, that paced a mile in 2.25 in Lexington, Kentucky, a few months ago. Dolly Halsted, dam of Administrator, is the only mare by Mambrino Chief that produced a 2.30 trotter by Hambletonian, 10.

IS IT THE URUGUAY?

Nova Scotia Schooner Missing. BELIEVED TO HAVE FOUNDERED.

The Winnifred Dismantled.

HALIFAX, Oct. 31. The four-masted schooner Uruguay, owned by Shubael Dimock, of Windsor, unheeded for some time, is believed to have foundered off Boston with all hands. She is believed to be the unknown vessel which Capt. Chase, of the Soraphine, reported he had seen founder last Saturday. Her crew comprised Capt. Parsons, mates Elias Cochrane and James Morris; cook, Robert Henry; seaman, A. Crane, Herbert Hunter (all of Windsor), and four foreigners, besides a New York passenger named Slosson. The Uruguay was bound from Windsor for New York with plaster. She was insured for \$20,000 in Windsor offices.

THE QUEBEC BOODLERS

Enquiry Drawing to a Close.

WHAT THE COMMISSIONERS WILL DO

QUEBEC, Oct. 31. It is believed that the Royal Commission will close its labors on Wednesday as the Judges seem disposed to rush through their work. It is pretty evident that they have reached a unanimous opinion on the Grit boodler transaction. They will not do like the commissioners in the case of the Pacific Railway scandal, who reported the evidence alone, but Judges Jette, Baby and Davidson will present a finding to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

Honors for Balfour.

LONDON, Oct. 31. Hon. Mr. Balfour, the new Government leader in the British House of Commons, has been elected Chancellor of the Edinburgh University.

Threaten to Resign.

DUBLIN, Oct. 31. The Dublin Freeman's Journal says that if Redmond is defeated in Cork, all the Parnellite members will resign their seats.

Escaped Disqualification.

OTTAWA, Oct. 31. Trow, the Ontario Grit, has been unseated for South Perth, but escaped disqualification. This is the first case—and a Grit goes.

Famine Feared.

BUDA PESTH, Oct. 31. The Potato crop of Northern Hungary is a complete failure. In consequence a famine is feared.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Additional advices received from Tunis show that thirty natives were buried by the collapse of the large wall undermined by the recent storms and floods. All perished. Rescuing parties have recovered 18 bodies.

PARIS, Oct. 29.—In this city, on Monday, a bride of 17 committed suicide by taking laudanum on the evening of her wedding day. She told her husband, who is 36 years old, that she loved another and had sworn to be true to him.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 29.—During a Farmers' Alliance meeting at Buckport, Arkansas, last night, a free fight occurred among the audience. Shotgun and pistols were used with deadly effect, five men being killed and several wounded. Politics was the cause of the row.

MONTREAL, Oct. 29.—The board of management of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church have drawn up a memorial for presentation to the Dominion Government, asking that steps be taken to prevent the introduction of Chinese women into British Columbia for immoral purposes.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 29.—Ellsworth Luse, of Rostraver Township, was arrested at his house this morning and lodged in jail at Greensburg, for the attempted wrecking of a passenger train on the McKeesport and Bellvernon railroad, near McMahon Station, last Monday night, and for the same offence last night. Luse, who is about 30 years old, confessed to both crimes. He appears to have been actuated solely by a mischievous spirit, as he says he hid near by just to see the thing strike. He is held in \$4,000 bail.
