

Well Known Retired S' Side Business Man Dies At 86

The death of Mr. William T. Matheson, 86, well known Summerside resident, occurred yesterday morning in Prince County Hospital.

In very good health until two weeks ago, the late Mr. Matheson suffered a heart attack at that time, and this was followed by pneumonia. He was transferred to hospital last Friday and passed away about 7.30 yesterday morning.

Born in Summerside on December 26, 1871, he lived here all his life and was employed in the grocery and produce trades. For a number of years he was manager of Holman's grocery department, and was also a manager of Gunn, Langlois, Ltd., a poultry firm which operated here some years ago.

Mr. Matheson is survived by his wife, the former Sarah M. Matheson, who he celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary last October 19th.

He is also survived by two sons, and six daughters.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Jacob MacNaught, O'Leary; and Mrs. R. M. Gaudet, Vancouver.

Mr. Matheson was a member of the Summerside Fire Department for many years and was fire chief when he retired from the department in 1929.

He was always keenly interested in sports, and up to the time of his illness one of his greatest

enjoyments was to watch sports contests on television. Only a couple of days before he became ill he had watched a curling match at the Summerside Curling Club.

He was an active fisherman, even as recently as last summer. In his religious affiliation he was a member of Trinity United Church, in which he was a member of the Men's Choir.

Now resting at the Bowness Funeral Home, the funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon at Trinity Church. The funeral is being delayed until Sunday because Mrs. Hollett will be arriving in Summerside on Saturday night from Fort William. Mr. J. F. Arnett Outlines Work Of S' Side Rotary Club

J. Frank Arnett was special speaker at a Rotarian banquet last evening in the Summerlea Restaurant, attended by members of the local Rotary Club and Rotarians, held to mark the 53rd anniversary of Rotary throughout the world. President R. L. Mollison presided and welcomed the Rotarians and Bud Mountain was master of ceremonies.

Mr. Arnett gave an interesting history of Rotary, the members of which, he said, are banded together by an ideal — the ideal of service to others. He said the Rotary Clubs all over the world are carrying out many different kinds of service activities in their own communities, but there is one very interesting project in which all Rotary Clubs are participating. That is the program of the Rotary Foundation, which provides one year of advanced study abroad for outstanding graduate students.

In relating part of the service of the Summerside Club of which the speaker is past president, he said, "our Rotary Club was organized in 1943 and over the years our principal activities have been financial assistance to Prince County Hospital, providing an x-ray machine costing in excess of \$8,000, contributing to the build-
