NOT IDENTICAL

Each species has its own characteristic coloring. This is the general rule. A Hermit Thrush is recognized by a particular shade of brown on its back and a redder brown tail. A Crow is distinctly black, a Catbird grey, and so on. However, quite a number of species can be confusing because the male and female are always differently coloured, at least in their summer costumes. The bright yellow of Mr. Goldfinch is replaced by greenish on his wife. Mr. Indigo Bunting is distinctly blue, while Mrs. is grey with only a suspicion of blue. A few kinds of birds break all rules, producing two or more distinct types or "phases" as they are called, and these may come from the same parents. Even when both mother and

BOSTON, Jan. 25 — (CP) — Boston's improving Bruins unleashed their highest scoring spree of the National Hockey League season Saturday night as they blanked New York Rangers 9-0 at Boston Garden.

Jerry Toppazzini scored three goals as Boston cooled off New York—which had whipped the league-leading Detroit Red Wings 8-2 in its previous outing.

The Bruins' young centre, Red Sullivan, scored once and assisted on five others. He set up linemate Toppazzini three times and Jack McIntyre twice.

The other Boston scorers were Milt Schmidt, Leo Labine and Pentti Lund.

TORONTO 2, DETROIT 0 TORONTO, Jan. 25 — (CP) — Right-winger George Armstrong supplied the offensive power and goalie Harry Lumley was unbeatable Saturday night as Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Detroit Red Wings 2-0.

A crowd of 13,634 National Hockey League fans saw the game. Leafs' first victory in four starts. Armstrong, a 22-year-old sophomore in the first period and again in the third to account for all the scoring.

That was more than enough cushion for Lumley, who turned in a terrific chore against his teammates of three seasons ago. It was his sixth shutout of the season. Both goals came with the wings short-handed through penalties.
