

General Telegraphic News.

MADRID, June 13.—Terrific thunder storms prevailed in various parts of Spain yesterday. At Melias, in the province of Orense, the parish church was struck by lightning during service. Ten persons were instantly killed and 28 injured. At Mucientes, in Valladolid, a church was also struck. Five of the worshippers were killed and 10 injured.

L'ASSOCIATION, June 13.—Rocher, conservative, opposing Jeannotte, also a conservative, has retired in the bye-election in this county, and the latter will be elected by acclamation.

MONTREAL, June 13.—Morceur will certainly not take his seat in the Legislature, but in the meantime his friend Paquet states that he has received the following note from a gentleman in this city:

St. PAUL, Minn., June 13.—Judge Albion W. Tourgeon, said yesterday: "If there is a marked change in the attitude of the country towards the colored race, we shall have within the next ten years a massacre unparalleled since the French revolution. I am amazed the negro has been so patient under the persecution he has had to endure. Judge Tourgeon said further that the republican party is not doing its duty toward colored men.

MONTREAL, June 13.—Rev. W. H. Pulsford has resigned the pastorate of Emmanuel Congregational church in this city, owing it is said to difficulties with his congregation and reasons over his attire, which they claim to be unbecomingly clerical. It is generally of a neatly made cutaway coat, fashionable young man's vest, latest style trousers, run down collar with nicely tied four-in-hand ornamented with a diamond ring; sometimes lavender pants and white vest. Financial difficulties are also spoken of in connection with the church.

CASPER, Me., June 13.—A cyclone struck West Brookville this morning and the rear end of Geo. Gray's store was moved six feet, the bridge rails were divided, plank on the Grange wharf blown away and the smoke stack of the Bagaduce lumber mill was blown down and broken in pieces. One hundred and fifty thousand feet of lumber were blown away, the joists were blown through the window and knocked Mrs. Gray senseless and injured her somewhat. Minor damage was caused all about the vicinity. Hailstones fell the size of a robin's egg.

Will Asiatic Cholera Follow?

Mr. Joe Howard's theory that, one horror of a similar nature follows another to the number of three, has a chance for confirmation this coming summer if certain predictions prove true. First it was La Grippe; "A whim" the French define it. Second came deaths by scores from its after effects, or from the many atmospheric changes of the past few months. 2nd. Speak in a moderate tone of voice, not too loud, and distinctly.

3rd. Place the telephone so as to cover the ear, just as if you wished to shut out all other sounds. Do not press too hard on the ear.

It is possible to talk and be heard when standing back two or three feet from the transmitter, if you speak loud enough, but it is not a pleasant mode of conversation, is entirely unnecessary, and is a needless waste of wind and lungs, besides being very annoying, to all within range of your voice.
