

S'side Council Approves Street Paving Program

SUMMERSIDE — Street committee chairman, H. B. Schurman announced yesterday that the paving of Northumberland, Granville, Carvell streets, Maple, Milton and Schurman avenues, and the widening of Water Street East have been approved by the town council.

Councillor Schurman stated that the unpaved section of Water Street East between Water Street and Schurman Avenue will be completed by the end of the year. The paving of Northumberland and Street together with a new sidewalk will prove of great benefit to children attending Elm Street school, the majority of whom would use Northumberland once it is improved. He further commented that since Granville street is one of the most heavily travelled thoroughfares in Summerside, the street committee considers it essential that the unpaved section of Victoria road be completed immediately. Tenders for the project have been called with a target date for completion set for July 15.

The widening of the south side of Water street from Eustace Street to Ellis Brook will also ease heavy traffic congestion. The widening of the widened section of Water Street east, carried out in 1961 by the department of highways.

OTHER PAVING
The remaining streets to be paved are Maple Avenue, between Centre and Granville Streets, and Carvell Avenue between Carvell and Arona Streets, Milton Avenue between Carvell and Arona Streets, and Carvell Street between Carvell and Arona Streets.

It is stressed that tax payers on this last group of streets have endured a great deal of inconvenience for a long period, and the street committee recommends their improvement at this time.

Junior Red Cross Training Centre Program Planned

For the first time, Prince Edward Island will be the site of the Atlantic Provinces Junior Red Cross Training Centre this summer, when delegates from the five eastern provinces assemble at Montgomery Hall for

the sessions run. It from July 3-13. With 110 delegates, Junior Red Cross directors and teachers expected to attend, final details are now being completed for a program designed to foster common interests and activities among the youth of all provinces, and an increased ability to lead other students along the path of good citizenship.

The program will follow a theme for each day as much as possible. Mrs. W.W. Reid, director of JRC for P.E.I. said, with the first week given over mainly to workshop type activities and the second week devoted to the international aspect of Red Cross.

Each delegate will be given a chance for individual participation that will assist in developing leadership qualities, and will get an overall picture of Red Cross activities in general. A student council will be formed with two or three delegates from each province elected to serve on it. This body is responsible for the smooth running of the centre, and serves as a medium between delegates and staff. They will meet periodically to discuss the program, recreation, and they will also be responsible for the discipline of the delegates.

Each day will be assigned to a particular province, with the delegates from that province being responsible for announcements, thank yous, etc. The planned recreation for the week:

FIRST PERIOD
The first period of the agenda will feature workshops held twice daily for three days in international exchange, inter relations and community services. Delegates will divide into three groups which will rotate among the workshops to hear provincial directors deliver lectures pertaining to each shop topic. Display of related articles will be on hand as well as patterns of the forms for the delegates to take to their schools.
