THE PRESIDENT HAS HIS REVENGE

For the Insults of a Week Ago.

HE MAKES ANOTHER TRIP TO ANTEUIL RACES.

Road Lined With Troops. He had a Good Reception.

PARIS, June 12.—In the great public demonstration given President Loubet at the Anteuil races, he had his revenge for the insults of a week ago.

The Government, however, was prepared for trouble.

Fifteen thousand troops lined the road, the president literally passing through a double hedge of steel.

Armed police rode by his carriage with revolvers cocked. The public gave the President a splendid reception.

A few royalist attempts to make disturbances were promptly quelled by the Republican Guards.

A DESTRUCTIVE FIRE

In the Armstrong Ordnance Works.

NEW CASTLE ON TYNE, June 12.—A most destructive fire occurred yesterday as a result of which three of the largest workshops in the famous Armstrong-Whitworth Works were destroyed. The loss is estimated at a million of dollars.

Venezuelan Commissioner.

LONDON, June 10.—The Attorney General, Sir Richard Webster, Q. C., Robert Thersbie Reid, Q. C., the former Attorney-General, and Mr. G. R. Asquith, the Venezuelan Boundary Commissioner, started for Paris on the 8th. O hers leave at the end of the week, and the Lord Chief Justice, Baron Russell of Killowen, and Sir Richard Henn Collins, Lord Justice of Appeal, will leave for the French capital shortly, in order to be present at the opening of the Venezuela boundary arbitration, June 15. Counsel for Venezuela and Mr. Malet-Prevost, secretary of the Boundary Commission, have statements of the case amounting to 6,000 pages of closely printed matter in Spanish, Dutch, French and English, accompanied by 200 maps. The opening speech of Sir Richard Webster is expected to last 16 days.

Arbitration Suggested

LONDON, June 10.—The Westminster Gazette says a rumor is current from a well informed source, that it has been proposed in a responsible quarter that the United States mediate between Great Britain and the Transvaal. It is added that the suggestion is being considered and "it is even not improbable that such mediation may be undertaken."

Government to Acquire More Railways.

OTTAWA, June 12.—Saturday's excursion of the members of Parliament on the Parry Sound Railway in the Inter-colonial train is said to be one of the preliminary proceedings looking towards the acquisition by the Government of both systems of railway, including Parry Sound and the Canada Atlantic Railway extending from Montreal to Georgian Bay, a distance of four hundred miles.

The Grand Duchesse

HALIFAX, June 12.—The new steamer, of the Plant Line, the Grand Duchesse, arrived at Halifax yesterday having made a record trip from Boston, the passage taking 21 hours and 47 minutes.

Backed By All the Boers.

BRUSSELS, June 10.—Dr. Leyds, in an interview today, said: "The Transvaal is thoroughly prepared against attack if an understanding is not arrived at. President Kruger will be backed by all the Boers. They will fight to the bitter end. I do not believe, however, there will be war. The British Government is inclined to be conciliatory, and so are we."

Fatal Lightning Stroke.

MITCHELL, Ont., June 9.—Dan McCarthy was struck dead by lightning while working in his stable yard. He had remarked to his hired man after the flash which preceded the fatal one that they had better get out of there. One of the team of horses was also struck down, but recovered. The deceased was 58 years of age, unmarried, and the well to-do owner of a two-hundred-acre farm.

For the Transvaal.

LONDON, June 10.—Among the news concerning the Transvaal crisis the Chronicle prints the following: "The Government on Thursday asked a well-known firm how soon and on what terms it could supply 1,300 military transport wagons." The Daily Mail claims to have reliable information that Sir Alured Miller has placed his back to the wall, and that he is supported to the utmost by the Cabinet.

The People Have Begun to Leave Johannesburg.

LONDON, June 12.—The London newspapers contain despatches reporting that President Kruger of the Transvaal Republic, who recognizes that he must do something, will propose to the Transvaal Rand the abolition of the dynamite monopoly, which has been one of the greatest grievances of the Uitlanders.

A Cape Town despatch says that the people of Johannesburg are alarmed at the serious condition of affairs and are already beginning to leave the city, and that as a result business is practically at a standstill.

Ex-Mayor Prince Dead.

BOSTON, June 12.—Ex Mayor Prince of this city is dead.

The Pacific Cable.

LONDON, June 10.—The Times announces, this morning, that the British Government has consented to reconsider its attitude towards the Pacific cable project as the result of urgent representations from Canada and other colonies, and it is now inclined to utilize British credit in providing the necessary capital.

Foreign Competition.

GLASGOW, June 10.—At a mass meeting here of manufacturers, ship owners, and merchants, a resolution was passed expressing alarm at the serious injury to British and colonial trade arising from the continued and threatened extension of foreign competition. Mr. Anderson, of the Anchor line, said America and Germany were taking markets where Great Britain had long been pre-eminent. He added that British subjects had not received just support from the Government, asserting that the Board of Trade has assumed the character of police, and claimed the Foreign Office only moved when the steed was stolen.

For Friendship's Sake.

BERLIN, June 10.—In an interview with the Madrid correspondent of the Lokale Anzeiger today, Premier Silvela said: "The adoption by the Cortes of the Caroline treaty is certain. To no other country than her dear friend, Germany, would Spain prefer to give the islands."

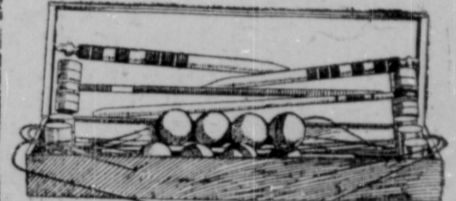
