Various Phases Of Police Work Outlined In Course

All phases of police work and procedure are being spelled out for more than 50 policemen of this province attending the three-day 'in-service training' course being conducted at the RCMP barracks here.

Featuring today's session will be an address by Attorney-General M.J. McQuaid who previously gave complete approval of the course designed and a brief talk by J.A. McGuigan, deputy attorney-general.

Highlighting the opening session yesterday was a welcoming talk by Insp. A.S. McNeil, officer commanding 'L' Division, RCMP, who reminded the group that complete co-operation between all enforcement agencies was vital to successful police work.

Features of the proceedings attended yesterday by representatives of every enforcement agency in the province were lectures on traffic control by Cpl. Eric Tedford; the powers of arrest, by S-Sgt. T. J. Keefe; first aid, which is being carried throughout the course in twice daily sessions, by Sgt. George Chipman; national police services, by Cpl. Red MacKenzie; the policing of municipalities and enforcement of by-laws, by Chief of Police Charles MacArthur of Charlottetown; the role of police in major disasters, by Sgt. Maj. M.F. Hagan.

Following the end of lectures each afternoon an optional session in revolver shooting is being conducted for municipal officers by Inspector McNeil and Cst. Robert Williams.

Today's talks will be on traffic law enforcement by Cpl. Tedford; civil defence, by Insp. McNeil; enforcement of the Liquor Control Act, by Cst. William Davis; searches, by Sgt. R.O. Lively; presentation of evidence and court procedure by S-Sgt. Keefe.

ACCIDENT REPORTS
The importance of the proper compilation of motor vehicle accident reports and correct procedure for doing so will be outlined by J.A. Gallant, provincial registrar of motor vehicles, at the concluding sessions of the course tomorrow.

Also on the program are lectures on accident investigation, by Cpl. Tedford; the admissibility of confessions and admissions, by Sgt. Maj. Hagan; basic fundamentals of civil defence, by Cst. Williams; the handling of exhibits, by Cpl. MacKenzie; and the handling of mental patients and prisoners, by Cpl. M. MacKinnon.
