FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer Fastnet, Captain Hopkins, arrived from Halifax via intermediate ports at ten o'clock this morning, with a general cargo and three passengers, Captain McGrath, F. Palmer and M. Rice. She left for Summerside at noon, and will return to-morrow morning, arriving about six, and will leave here on return to Halifax about four o'clock in the afternoon.

THE RAILWAY CHANGES.—A meeting was held at Bradalbane on Friday evening to consider the railway changes. The meeting was addressed by Hon. Peter Sinclair, A. B. Washburn, Esq., M. P. E. William Campbell, M. L. C., Charles Taper, Esq., and others. A resolution was passed condemning the changes and asking that the railway accommodation the people have hitherto enjoyed, and which they have a right to by the terms of union, be restored.

FOOTBALL.—A game of football was played on the Prince Street School grounds last evening between teams from the Thistles and Hillsborough clubs. Victory perched upon the banners of the Thistles, who thrashed their opponents by a score of 36 points to 0. Thistles will try to arrange a match with the Brighton Heroes.

A friendly game of football was played at Victoria Park last evening between the Y. M. C. A. team and the Victoria Club team. The game was keenly contested throughout, and resulted in a touch-down and a goal for the latter to nothing.

SEVENTH DAY ADVENTISTS.—A convention of Seventh Day Adventists was held in Moncton, beginning on Wednesday last and ending on Tuesday. Delegates were present from the different Advent churches in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island. On Sunday the first Seventh Day Adventist church in New Brunswick was organized in the Pythian Temple, where the meetings were held. Six converts were baptized on Sunday morning, a Hampshire's pond by Elder Cottrell, and in the afternoon these with five others were received into the church, thus establishing a branch at Moncton.

LOTS OF ICEBERGS.—The Norwegian bark, Europa, arrived at Newcastle from Arundel on Monday. Capt. Grundt, who is a regular trader to the Miramichi, reports seeing more icebergs on this 3rd and 4th of May in latitude 44 to 49 north long 43 to 48 west, than he has seen in his twenty years experience. They had heavy southerly winds and although weather was thick during two days they counted thirty-seven bergs and on one occasion passed between two which were very large. They were about 100 feet out of the water and not more than two length of his ship apart.

MORE ISLANDERS ABROAD.—A Boston despatch says: At the afternoon session of the divorce court, before Judge Fosenden, yesterday, Annie Livingstone, a tall, handsome woman, sought a separation from Alexander Livingstone, whom she wedded in 1881, at Charlottetown. Shortly afterward they moved to Boston. Alexander, it was alleged, soon became tired and shuffler, and spent most of his time hanging about bars or saloons. His wife found employment in a store, and by sitting up late at night, managed to keep the household bills squared up. This went on for six months, during which time Alexander cruelly persecuted his wife. He came home one evening and kicked over the supper table, smashing the plates and scattering the food purchased by the toil of his wife. At one time he loaded up a revolver in the presence of Mrs. Livingstone, saying he was going to blow a hole through her. In some quence of these cruelties she was greatly weakened in strength and decided to live by herself. Judge Fosenden returned the libellant of the yoke she had so long borne.

THE RING.—The boxing contest between Geo. O'Grady and Joe Lannon, at Coney Island Athletic Club, on Monday night, attracted about 2,500 spectators. WANTED, A ROPE.—We are informed that the scow plying across West River from Farquharson's wharf was not operated during the greater part of yesterday for the want of a rope to haul it across, and people who desired to get across the river on business had to drive all the way round by the bridge. The rope came to grief early in the forenoon, and the scow was laid up nearly all the day—all for the want of a rope. This is how the Peters-McLean-Farquharson combination is accommodating the people of West River.

DEAD BODY FOUND.—The dead body of an infant was last evening found in the People's Cemetery, St. Peter's Road, by Keeper Gregory. The body was packed in a small box, and attired in a white dress. The box was under the ground, with the top on a level with the sod. The keeper reported his "find" to the police, who in turn notified the Coroner. A jury was empanelled, and it was decided to hold an inquest this forenoon, but when the coroner and jury arrived on the scene, the medical man who was to make the post mortem examination identified the body as that of a still-born infant of which the daughter of a well-known colored resident of the city had been delivered a few days ago, and which had evidently been buried in that way to save funeral expenses. Under the circumstances, it was not considered necessary to hold an inquest.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

A Timely Suggestion. Sir,—Thinking that the use of a fire-proof linewash on some of the shingle roofs of our city might be the means of preventing some fires, I send you the enclosed receipt, taken from "Chase's Receipts." That it is a good thing I have proved, and others can also easily prove by dipping a shingle in the solution, letting it dry, and seeing how difficult it is to ignite. The only objection appears to be its light color, which lampblack or metallic paint mixed with it would, to a certain extent, remedy, although, perhaps, without the color, the coating would last longer. I have not sent this to the other papers, but if they think it worthy, I should be glad if they will publish the receipt. E. W. TAYLOR.

FIRE PROOF PAINT FOR ROOFS. Slack stone lime by putting it in a tub to be covered to keep in the steam. When slaked pass the powder through a fine sieve; and to each 5 quarts of it add 1 quart of rock salt and water 1 gallon. Then boil and skim clean. To each 5 gallons of this add pulverized alum, 1 lb.; pulverized copperas, 2 lb.; and still slowly add powdered potash, 2 lb.; then fine sand or fine ash, 4 lbs. Now add any desired color and apply with a brush, looks better than paint and is as durable as slate; stops small leaks, prevents moss, and makes it imcombustible and renders brick impervious to wet.

Ulster Would Fight. AN IRISH PARLIAMENT WOULD BE MET BY ARMED RESISTANCE.

Doubt is expressed in many quarters regarding the earnestness of the Ulster movement against Home Rule, and this has incited the leaders to a more violent beating of the war drum.

Mr. Sanderson's recent speech at the Stephens Club dinner, openly proclaimed the intention of the Ulsterites to resort to armed force in their resistance to a Dublin parliament. Ulster would be said, make short work of the Irish House of Commons. He led the largest united section of Irishmen, who would be able, if they were tested, to wreck the Dublin Parliament. His declarations were received with enthusiastic cheers.

While the Lord Chancellor censures the language as dangerous, the theory of rebellion is heard in silence. Several members of the Cabinet side with the Lord Chancellor in condemning Lord Salisbury's incitement to civil war, but the rank and file of the Tories approve it.

Mr. J. W. Lowther, Parliamentary Secretary of the foreign office, speaking at a recent public gathering, referred to the expressed belief that Ulster would evoke the aid of English loyalists, and said that the result would be that the world see the sternest contest since England was created a nation. This was received with loud cheers.

On the whole, the conviction strengthens that the Ulster convention will be a history-making event. The recent approval of Irish Non-Conformist ministers to their brethren in Great Britain has been reinforced by a circular signed by Rev. D. Brown, chairman of the Irish Presbyterian Assembly; Dr. Lynd, an ex-chaplain of that body; Dr. Usher, a leading Baptist, and Mr. Gursli, a prominent Methodist, again declaring the certainty of a sanguinary civil war, if Ireland be placed under a Parliament wherein priestly influence will be paramount.
