Ottawa Prepares

(Continued from page 1)

Cabinet committee on public information that Thursday's opening would follow the same procedure as for the war emergency session of 1914. The House will open at three o'clock in the afternoon with the traditional ceremony presided over by Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor-General of Canada. But there will be no display and the officials including His Excellency, will wear plain morning attire. The address in reply to the speech from the Throne will be moved at once by Lt. Col. H. S. Hamilton, Liberal member for Algoma West, and seconded by J. A. Banchelet, Liberal member for Compton.

Will Table White Paper

Speeches by Prime Minister Mackenzie King and Opposition Leader Marlon will be delivered the following day but a great deal of information will be given the House Thursday when a white paper will be tabled covering correspondence bearing upon the crisis, accompanied by copies of orders in council passed under the authority of the War Measures and other acts since the outbreak of war and earlier. It was decided to delay debate on the address in reply to the speech from the Throne until all members have had a chance to study the white paper and orders in council.

Dr. Marlon will lead off the debate and be followed by the Prime Minister who will give a statement of the Government's policy and its actions during the crisis. Mackenzie King refused comment today on reports that Col. Ralston will be taken.

Conservative Support

Dr. Marlon held a caucus of his House of Commons supporters today and said his followers were unanimous in a desire to co-operate and assist the Government in a national war effort. Members of the Conservative Commonwealth Federation under leadership of J. S. Woodsworth are expected to hold a meeting tomorrow and Social Credit members will meet prior to Thursday's opening.

Commons Will Vote Lump Sum For War Purpose

OTTAWA, Sept. 5.—(CP) Parliament will be asked on Thursday to confirm the various orders in council passed by the Government relating to the security of Canada in the conflict. Also both Houses are expected to put their stamp of approval on the Government's warrants issued to meet "unforeseen expenditures" due to the war. So far as preparing the armed forces of the country are concerned, these disbursements run into large sums. At the same time the House will appropriate a lump sum to enable the Government to prosecute the war, sufficient until the regular session comes round early in 1940.

In 1941 at its special session called by the late Sir Robert Borden a total of \$50,000,000 was appropriated. The first amount allocated for war was \$20,000,000 and the remainder consisted of Government warrants for monies authorized during the period between the outbreak of war on Aug. 4 and the meeting of Parliament.

Defense Force

Instead of two obsolescent cruisers, such as the Plover and Rainbow, which with two small sloops, the Algerine and Shearwater, comprised the navy a quarter of a century ago, Canada has several auxiliary vessels, all of them up-to-date in every respect.
