Wolsey at Alexandria.

Ulemas Depose the Sultan.

The Sultan's Orders to Arabi.

General Sir Garnet Wolsey, Commander-in-Chief of the British force in Egypt, arrived at Alexandria to-day. The General seems to be in fair health, and has already created some stir here.

As soon as Arabi heard of the backing down of the Sultan from his previous position, Arabi called together a meeting of the Ulemas, the highest religious and politico-political functionaries of Islam. These met in solemn conclave on Sunday last, and formally deposed the Sultan from the Caliphate. The Sultan is the official head of all the Mohammedans. The Ulemas drew attention to the fact that the Sultans of Turkey had occupied this position for about three hundred years, having at that time ousted the Arabian Dynasty from their real claims and titles.

Rumors gained ground yesterday, that King Cetewayo had been re-ordered to Court, and that his pathetic appeal to be restored to his people would gain a favorable hearing. He had an interview with the Queen at Osborne House, and at this he was informed that the Government would reconsider his position.

Doings in Dublin.

Parrell Wants Repeal of the Union.

The O'Connell statue was formally unveiled by the Lord Mayor to-day. The proceedings were quiet. The Exhibition at Dublin was opened to-day. One hundred thousand persons were present, Parnell, Davitt, and Dillon were present, and made some scathing speeches. The authorities took the precautionary measures of confining the military to the barracks, and consequently there was no disturbance.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 14. The Mussulman jurists, whom the Sultan frequently consults, explain that Arabi, in so far as he disobeyed the Caliph, is a rebel and may be unceremoniously treated as such; but in so far as he has been the defender of aggressive designs of the Christian, he has merely fulfilled the duties of a good Mussulman, and consequently the Caliph cannot make common cause with England. The Sultan may punish Arabi if some act of rebellion is proven against him, but he must not associate himself with those who wish to crush Arabi as the defender of Islam.

A correspondent says this will greatly influence the Turkish military action. It is understood that a divergence of view exists between the Porte and Dufferin respecting the working of the proclamation against Arabi Pacha. England insists upon commanding the Turkish troops. It is stated that the question will be brought before the Conference.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 14. The Khedive has appointed fifteen of his household officers to act as guides and interpreters to the advancing English army. Arabi Pacha's troops are unusually busy erecting earthworks beyond Mallaha junction.

Last evening some shots were exchanged and several prisoners captured near the canal. There were some casualties. A captain in the Egyptian army, the supposed bearer of despatches to Arabi Pacha, has been captured at Suez. A number of Arabic documents, supposed to be important, were found on him.

DUBLIN, Aug. 14. In the Commission Court, to-day, decision was announced in the case of Timothy Rorke, John Connor, Richard Savage, and Maurice Costello, found guilty of having perpetrated several outrages in the County of Kerry. Rorke was sentenced to 15, and each of the others to 10 years penal servitude. The three men found guilty of a savage attack on a person named Sullivan, at Malrow, were sentenced to servitude for 20, 15 and 10 years respectively, and a man who fired at soldiers at Mullingar, was sentenced to a lifelong servitude.
