The Meeting Last Night.

ONE of the largest and most enthusiastic public temperance meetings ever held in this city was held under the auspices of the Grand Division S. of T., in the Market Hall last night. The Hall was uncomfortably crowded. The G. W. Patriarch, W. W. Beer, Esq., occupied the Chair.

The meeting was opened by a splendid address from Rev. Dr. Murray. He was followed by the Rev. G. W. Hodgson, who introduced and spoke at length to the following Resolution:—
Resolved, That this meeting earnestly hopes that there will be no unnecessary delay in issuing the proclamation to bring into force the Canada Temperance Act, in those parts of the Province which have adopted the same.

The Resolution was seconded by Rev. A. McGilvray, in an able, earnest and telling speech. Rev. J. McLeod supported it, and Rev. D. Fitzgerald delivered an excellent closing address.

St. Patrick's Band, which enlivened the evening by several airs, played the National Anthem at the close, and the audience dispersed well pleased with the success of the meeting.

P. E. Island Railway.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER, commenting on the Island Railway, a few days ago, said:—

"That the revenue of the road in 1877-78 was \$135,839, and for 1878-9 it was \$125,855 showing a falling off in traffic, owing to the depression of business throughout the Island having continued in a more intensified form than during the previous year. The passenger traffic fell off considerably, and owing to the small prices realized on farm produce, and fisheries, the freight business was greatly reduced. It was now paying to send them by rail. The operating expenses were for 1877-78, \$221,599; for 1878-79, \$223,315; increase in cost of working, \$1,714. The increase in the cost of working may be attributed to the heavy renewals of sleepers, which was anticipated in the report of the previous year, there being 31,024 sleepers renewed; also, to increase in wharf accommodation at Summerside and cost of repairs. The working expenses for the nine months ending the 31st of March, 1879, were \$176,393, and for nine months of the succeeding year, \$120,740—showing the actual saving to be \$55,652. The receipts for the nine months ending 31st March, 1879, were \$96,561, and for the corresponding period of 1880, were \$84,252. These figures showed that the loss for the nine months ending 31st March, 1879, was \$79,831, and for the same period this year, it was \$36,487."

AN ISLANDER ABROAD.—Mr. Humphrey Mellish, son of Mr. James Mellish, of Lot 48, who was for several years a student at Prince of Wales College, has been distinguishing himself at Dalhousie College, Halifax. At a convocation held last week he stood the highest of the class of the second year and was awarded the first prize for classics, the St. Andrews prize for mathematics, chemistry and logic. Mr. Mellish's marks, which were the highest, would have also entitled him to the North British Society Bursary had he been of Scottish parentage.—Patriot.

A BOOM IN CANADIAN COAL.—It is said by a prominent Montreal coal dealer that the lowest price at which British coal can be laid down in Montreal by steamer for the next three months, owing to high ocean freights, &c., is \$5.78. Picton coal can be laid down in Montreal for \$4.25, a difference in favor of Picton coal of \$1.53. Cape Breton coal can be laid down in Montreal at \$3.50, a difference in favor of Cape Breton coal of \$2.28. Also that, having secured paying cargoes, steamers will obtain all their bunker coal for the return trip on this side instead of bringing it with them as usual from Great Britain, and that this will make a difference in favor of Canadian coal of thousands of tons. One steamship company has already given an order for 12,000 tons, delivered at their steamers at Montreal this summer.

THE COST OF SUPPORTING THE ROYAL FAMILY.—The total annual allowance to the Royal Family of Britain is £546,000, divided as follows: The Queen, £335,000; the Prince of Wales, £40,000; Princess of Wales, £10,000; Crown Prince of Prussia, £8,000; Duke of Edinburgh, £25,000; Princess Christian of Schleswig Holstein, £6,000; Princess Louise, £6,000; Duke of Connaught, £25,000; Prince Leopold, £15,000; Duchess of Cambridge, £6,000; Duchess of Mecklenberg Strelitz, £6,000; Duke of Cambridge, £12,000; Duchess of Teck, £5,000. In addition to her annuity, the Queen receives the rents of the Duchy of Lancaster, £40,000 per annum; the Prince of Wales also receives the rents of the Duchy of Cornwall, £60,000 per annum.

Fire in Richmond, Me., on Wednesday, destroyed \$110,000 worth of property, including several shoe factories, by which 200 persons lose employment.

Latest News Notes.

The insurrection in Albania is spreading.

The King of Siam is to visit Europe and the United States.

Russia will shortly issue a new railway loan of £15,000,000 stg.

Russia will increase her import duties of iron very considerably.

Gladstone has his two sons Herbert and William in Parliament with him this time.

A Cape Town despatch says the ex-Empress Eugenie had arrived at Durban, and was well.

The Duke of Edinburgh visited the United States ship "Constellation," at Queens-town, on Saturday last.

Barnum has now reached his seventieth year, and in spite of numerous ups and downs is worth \$2,000,000.

Fifty thousand oranges are to be furnished daily from Florida to a large wine firm in Buffalo to make into wine.

Lord Archibald Campbell has sailed from England en route to Ottawa, to visit his brother, the Governor-General, and the Princess.

It is understood that a general review of the Dominion forces will take place in Halifax next year similar to that which will take place this year at Quebec.

The Conservatives of Oxford city are determined to contest the re-election of Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt, who has accepted office in the new English Liberal Government.

RECIPROCITY.—The Americans may well be anxious about a reciprocity treaty. Their trade with Canada since 1872 has only been exceeded by the trade with Great Britain.

Congress has not yet been able to agree on a mode of spending the ten millions surplus on and beyond meeting the claims on the sum paid by England under Geneva award.

While reports of King Theebaw's death are not confirmed, official intelligence has reached India that he is suffering from some dangerous malady, and attempts are being made to stay the disease by the sacrifice of virgins.

Emperor William has written the Czar, advising him to stay at Livadia three months for the restoration of his health, and to entrust his affairs to the Czarowitch and General Melikoff, but the Czar has declined to do so.

A telegram from Montenegro was received at Mr. Gladstone's house, after his election, informing him that the Montenegrin nation congratulated him on the great victory which the Liberal party had just achieved, and at the same time declared that the Montenegrins would never forget his championship of the cause of freedom—"Never, never, never."

The Bank of Montreal has reduced its half yearly dividend from 5 to 4 per cent for the current six months. In view of the contraction in business and the greater difficulty banks now have in earning dividends, the reduction is, according to the *Monetary Times*, considered by those versed in financial affairs to be a wise step, though it falls hard on many whose income from this source is thus cut down one-fifth.

THE ONTARIO WHEAT CROP PROSPECTS.—Says the *Toronto Globe*:—"The fall wheat looks very well in North Dumfries. If nothing else comes against it there will be a fair average crop. In heavy clay land there has been considerable damage done. The clover is badly killed. There is no doubt but that the hay crop will be light. About Seaforth the fall wheat looks better, and will be a better crop than was anticipated."

A despatch from Calcutta says a portion of the Afghan army that was defeated at Ghuznee, attacked a small force under General Jenkins, at Charisab, but were repulsed after a long fight, leaving one hundred dead. The British loss was trifling; General Stewart also had another engagement near Ghuznee with 8,000 Afghans, occupying strong positions—from which they were dislodged, leaving 400 killed and wounded. The British are inclined to appoint Abdul Rahman Khan Ameer.

During religious services in the jail in Carson, Nev., and after a clergyman had addressed the prisoners on the text, "Honesty is the best policy," a thief named Jones asked if he could make a few remarks. Permission being given he said: "The expression that 'honesty is the best policy' was first thrown out by Ben Franklin, an old humbug. I don't agree with Ben Franklin that honesty should be a policy dodge. If a man's honest, he's honest anyhow; and if he just simply keeps correct from policy he's a bad egg at heart, and only willing to get the confidence of the community and rob them out of thousands. A man who is honest from policy would steal if he had the nerve and the chance."
