GOV'T OKAYS PLAN

Low-Rental Housing Expected Soon In City

The provincial government has decided to take part in a program under which it can enter agreements with municipalities and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation to provide low-rental housing.

Municipal Affairs Minister Leo Rosstier said last night that under the program formula, 75 per cent of the capital cost will be absorbed by CMHC, with the provincial government and the municipality involved sharing the balance of the cost equally.

"It is expected," said Mr. Rosstier, "that the first project under this new policy will be started in the City of Charlottetown."

The matter came up at yesterday's cabinet meeting when Mr. Rosstier presented a request of the city that the government take part in the new housing program. It was suggested that the city has a \$600,000 low-rental housing development scheme in mind.

Mr. Rosstier said the new program will be the "fourth phase of a government housing policy." He said "first there was co-operative housing, then senior citizens' housing and then homes of special care for the aged."

According to Mr. Rosstier, "under this new policy rental accommodation will be available to people in the low income groups, and any loss or profit in the maintenance and operation of the project will be shared to the extent of 75 per cent

by CMHC, with the provincial government and municipality involved sharing the balance equally."

Announcement Pleases Council Welfare Chairman

Arthur L. Wright, chairman of city council's welfare committee, last night expressed pleasure at the provincial cabinet's agreement to participate in the proposed low income housing project in Charlottetown.

Mr. Wright said he was "very pleased to hear the announcement, which came as the result of long and protracted efforts on the part of the City of Charlottetown to have active participation by the provincial government."

At a meeting yesterday, the

cabinet agreed to guarantee 12 1/2 per cent of the cost of a proposed 50 units and, in addition, 12 1/2 per cent of any deficits incurred in the operation of the low rental housing.

As the next step in the project, Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation will send a survey team to Charlottetown and in co-operation with the city will try to designate suitable sites for the housing units.

City council will then give its approval or disapproval of the sites.

Down With Dirty Shoes Through SDU Initiation

With these war-cries (or something similar), St. Dunstan's University freshmen, prodded by their seniors at the university and armed with placards and shoeshine paraphernalia, tomorrow will assault the scuffed shoe syndrome in Charlottetown, Summerside and Summerside RCMP Station.

It's all part of annual initiation rites at St. Dunstan's—but this year, the traditional frolics have a practical aspect.

Because the money students earn from tomorrow's shoeshine blitz will go to the research program of the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

St. Dunstan's is one of eight Canadian universities planning to raise money for the foundation. Other Maritime universities using Operation Shinerama as their initiation activity are Dalhousie in Halifax and Acadia in Wolfville, N.S.

Freshmen will be placed in groups of three at a strategic points around three areas of the province.

All money received will be given to the Cystic Fibrosis Society of Nova Scotia, which uses the funds for care and treatment of Nova Scotia and P.E.I. children afflicted with the disease.

Cystic fibrosis is said to be the most common and serious chronic disease of infancy and childhood. It may cause exten-

sive lung damage, and rivals cancer as a cause of death up to age 15.

Chairman of the fund-raising blitz here is Jerry Dunn, a publicist director is Robert Dupont. Both are senior students at SDU.

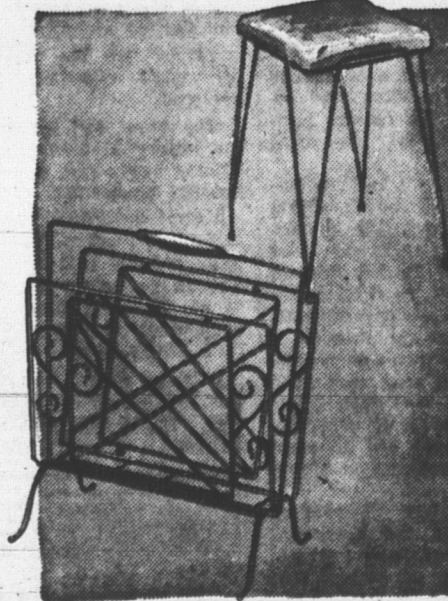

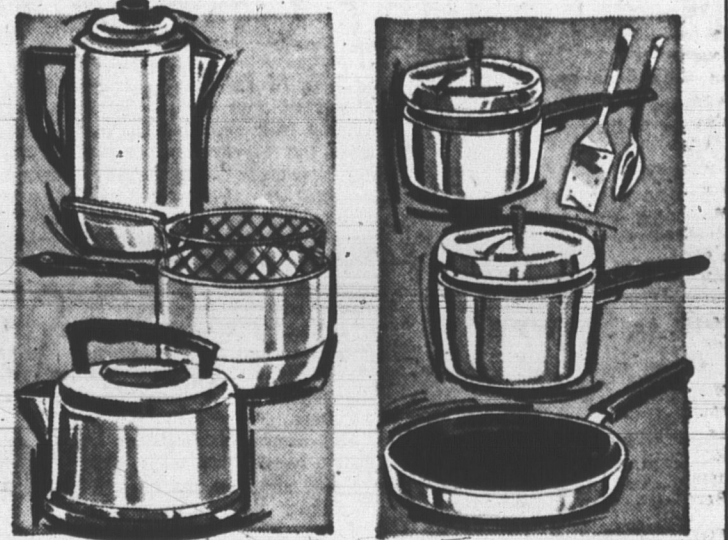
