PWC Pucksters Repeat Win

The Saint Dunstan's High School hockey team were shown again Tuesday night that a game is never over until the final whistle, especially when the opposition is Prince of Wales College. Several weeks ago the Saints and Welshmen met in the first game of their series, again the Saints had a three goal margin in the third period, and yet came out on the losing end of the final 6-5 score.

In this big four point game for first place the Welshmen scored four goals in the final 13 minutes and that was all that they needed. In the first two periods SDU were on top of the collegiates at every turn, and they will merit the 5-2 lead that they carried out of the first. Both goalies sparked on many occasions. The PWC crew were held at bay by the brilliant saves of Brown and when they did get the opportunity to put the puck behind him they blew it in the first stages of the game.

The Saints on the other hand made the most of every shot on nets, and despite the efforts of a determined Ellis ran up five goals. The blame for this must rest mostly on the shoulders of the PWC defensive corps for they were certainly not covering the front of the net as they should have been. Play throughout the match was at a blistering pace and perhaps this is the reason for the defense being caught out of position. A strange pattern emerged in the game as the Welshmen would score a goal to get back into contention, only to have the Saints come back less than a minute later and erase the PWC marker. On three different occasions it took the high school club only one minute, 33 and 31 seconds respectively to get back the goal and all three were from rebounds that the defense could have cleared.

Barry Ellis came up with big saves time and time again throughout the game and he can not be faulted for allowing six goals.

The situation was changed in the third session of play and oddly enough the Welshmen did not score their five goals from scrambles. Tuppy Rogers started the four unanswered goal spree for the winners as he stole the puck from the SDHS defense and after that point the red light blinked with frequency. Jamie Kennedy, beat Brown after having taken a Carl Duncan pass and then came the controversial point in the match. Alan Flood was forced to knock Kennedy down from behind as the former got a break and referees Don Whelan and Joe Coyle agreed that a penalty shot was in order, despite the furious protest of the Saints. Kennedy beat Brown and then Andy Arsenault potted a perfect pass at the 19:50 mark to put a perfect end to the evening.

This never say die attitude on the part of the Welshmen has won them two big games so far this year. However one of these times the late kick might fall them, especially now that there are four good teams instead of one. It should be a lot of fun to see the going from here to the end of the season.

SANDY PLEASED

"The best game that I ever saw the Royals play" was the way Sandy Frizel summed up his team's win against the Bantree Eastern Olympics and he has more than a small reason to be proud. This Bantree club is the U.S.'s hope for the 1968 Olympics and have been granted \$80,000 by the U.S. government. They have played numerous exhibition games this season against teams such as the Shearbrooke Beavers they lost 6-5, the Drummondville Rockets (They won 6-1 and 7-4), Brown University, Dalhousie University and numerous clubs in the Central loop.

The Royals, lost their first match against the Olympics 14-6 but this is understandable. The other member of the squad missing was the alternate goaltender. Having gotten a bit of rest between games the Royals exploded for 4 goals in the first period and then had three more scores in the second. TRING a bit in the third, the Royals allowed three goals but fought the Olympics off for a well deserved 4-3 triumph.

The Royals can indeed be proud of their efforts and when comparing their efforts to those of the Quebec teams one could conclude that the Royals are a lot stronger than most people give them credit for being. It should be interesting to see just how they do in Maritime playdowns.

Rangers Down Detroit; Black Hawks Whip Habs

NEW YORK (AP) — Third-period goals by Donnie Marshall and Jean Ratelle climaxed a New York comeback that gave the fifth-place Rangers a 4-3 victory over National Hockey League leading Detroit Red Wings Wednesday night.

The setback was Detroit's first loss this year and ended a nine-game unbeaten string for the Red Wings.

Marshall's 14th goal of the season, midway through the final period, tied it for the Rangers after New York had erased an early 2-0 Detroit lead.
