Harry Wills Dies Sunday

NEW YORK (AP)—Harry Wills, the old brown panther of the twenties who once received \$50,000 for not fighting Jack Dempsey for the heavyweight championship, died Sunday night. He was 66.
Wills was admitted to Jewish Memorial Hospital on Dec. 8 for a series of exploratory tests. Only last Friday an official of the hospital said he was not in critical condition.
The primary cause of his death was diabetes.
Wills fought more than 100 times in a 21-year career that started in 1911 in his home town, New Orleans.
But he never did get to fight Dempsey for the title. Once contracts were signed but Dempsey's lawyers forfeited his purse and Wills collected the \$50,000.
Wills said later the Dempsey fight never came off because of the racial issue at the time.
"It wasn't Jack's fault," he commented.

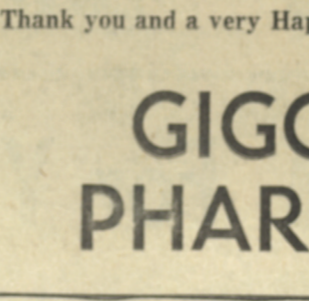

American Davis Cuppers Sweep Series Over Italy

PERTH, Australia (AP)—Barry MacKay, scrambling for a singles berth in the Davis Cup challenge round, and Alex Oimedo, already assured of a spot against the Australians, completed a 5-0 United States sweep over Italy in the interzone final today.
MacKay defeated Nicola Pietrangeli 6-4, 3-6, 5-7, 8-6, 8-6, and Oimedo whipped Orlando Sirola 20-18, 6-1, 6-4.
Actually the matches meant nothing, for the Americans already had clinched the best-of-five series when they won Saturday's doubles for a 3-0 lead.

But this still was a crucial test for MacKay, the University of Michigan graduate, Barry was demoted to the second string a week ago, and he was desperate to regain his spot as one of the singles players against Australia in the challenge round, scheduled for Brisbane next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

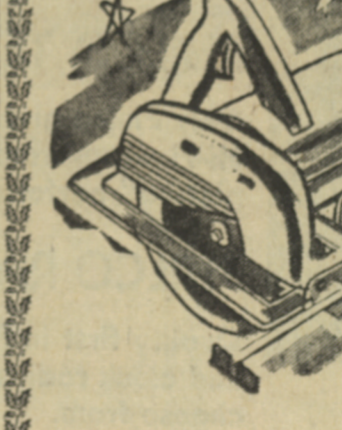

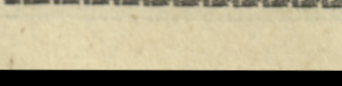

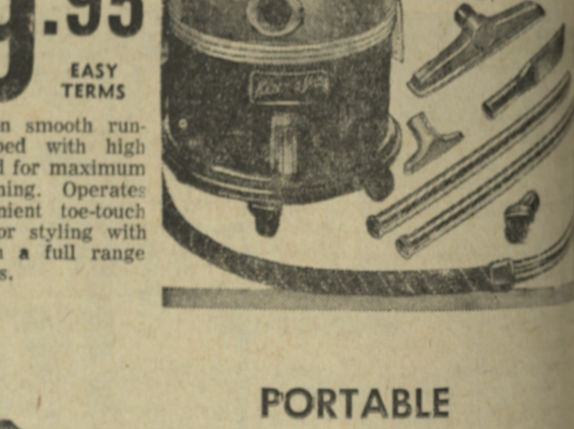
