Having an enraged lion charge at one is bad enough, but having to stop it by means of an arrow directed to its brain, thereby paralyzing all nerves of locomotion, is one of those things few men live to report! Howard Hill, archery expert whose recent adventures on a bow-and-arrow big game hunt have been captured on film under the title "Tembo", now playing at the Capitol, not only tells about it, but rears out the story. "People used to ask me if I was scared when that happened," he said in an interview, "and I said, 'Are you kidding!' Here Hill banged a mammoth fist down on the desk. 'I was scared green!' He explained that his heart was going "that way" bang, bang, bang went the fist! He explained that he sat down and tried to calm himself... that he was shaking from head to foot, that never, never would he take such a chance again, that he couldn't even collect his arrows which were scattered around him on the ground. "Nothing but God directed that last arrow to that lion's brain and stopped him," Hill said fervently, and shivered at the memory. It all happened during the safari when Hill, suffering from a broken leg he had collected while hunting jack-rabbits at home, stumbled by mistake into a small den where a lion was finishing off the remnants of a zebra meal. "Tembo" is a thrill-laden feature produced and directed by the world's outstanding archery expert, photographed in Africa en route, during Hill's big-game hunt.

Mr. Fisher was in his 92nd year. A man of mild and unassuming nature Mr. Fisher was a very prominent figure in his community throughout his long and successful career as a farmer. He was life-long member of the Liberal party, being very active in committee affairs. He was a member of the Roman Catholic Church and a devout member of the Holy Name Society. His wife, the former Elizabeth MacIntyre, predeceased him two years ago. The year prior to her death they had celebrated their diamond wedding jubilee. A son, Dr. J. C. They are Joseph and Florence at home, Leader at Scotchfort, Dr. William Fisher, Surgeon-in-Chief of Malden Hospital, Malden, Mass.; Mrs. Michael Joyce, Cambridge, Mass.; and Leona, Mrs. Constance Barbarski, Everett, Mass. The funeral will be held from his late residence to St. Bonaventure's Church, Tracadie on Tuesday morning.
