Boxer Harold Johnson suspended six months

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP)—Harold Johnson, long time No. 1 contender for lightweight championship Archie Moore's boxing crown was suspended for six months from the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission Wednesday night.

The commission, releasing its findings on a lengthy probe of Johnson's May 6 nationally televised bout with Julio Mederos, said Johnson acted "against the best interests of boxing" by failing to report prior to the fight that he was ill.

Johnson collapsed after the second round of the bout with the Cuban heavyweight and commission physicians subsequently reported that he had been drugged some time before he entered the ring.

DRUG SOURCE MYSTERY
The findings gave no indication that the commission or police investigators had been able to determine who administered the drug or how it got into Johnson's system.

The suspension is expected to be honored by other state boxing commissions.

Johnson's purse, \$4,113.33, was ordered forfeited and turned over to the state treasury.

The commission also revoked for six months the license of Johnson's manager of record, Thomas J. Loughrey, and the matchmaker's and promoter's license of Pete Moran. Moran was an employee of Herman Taylor, who staged the bout in the Philadelphia arena.

Two of Johnson's seconds, Louis Gross and Clarence Skippy Davidson, were also suspended, Gross for three months, and Davidson for six. The commission held that they willfully failed "to bring their knowledge of the unfit condition" of Johnson to the commission's attention at the fight.

The fight triggered a 90 day suspension of state boxing by Gov. George M. Leader. The suspension ends Aug. 9.

Commission chairman James Sleepy Jim Crowley, former Notre Dame football star, said a new boxing code would be submitted to the state legislature next week. He declined to reveal its contents.

Shaughnessy Says Chiefs Are Not For Sale But...

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—President Frank Shaughnessy of the International League was quoted Thursday as saying "Syracuse's baseball franchise has not been offered for sale but the Chiefs can't afford to run in Syracuse in the future unless supported better."

But Chiefs owner Martin D. Haske said only, "I have no comment to make at the present time," when he was asked about reports that baseball interests in Miami had been given the "green light" to plan for replacing Syracuse in the International League.

The Rochester Democrat and Chronicle says that Miami will take over the franchise next spring.

The Syracuse Herald-Journal telephoned Shaughnessy in Richmond, Va., Friday and quoted him as saying the Syracuse franchise had not been offered for sale.

"But there isn't anything else to do but give up in a city where they apparently don't want you, judging from lack of attendance at games."

The Chiefs, in the league for 7 years, frequently have played before gatherings of less than 500 fans in Syracuse this season.

Tigers Release Ferris Fain

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Tigers Wednesday gave a veteran first baseman Ferris Fain his unconditional release.

The 33-year-old infielder, considered one of the game's great competitors, has been bothered for the last year by an injured knee.

Fain came to the Tigers last Dec. 6 in a six-player trade with the Chicago White Sox. He was injured in the middle of last season with the Sox.

Although hampered by his knee, Fain had a batting average of .264 this season. He was the Tigers' regular first baseman through the early part of the season, but needed occasional rest periods.

There are at least three vessels on the east coast bearing the name Blue Star. All three were accounted for.

A check of marine basings along the Jersey coast showed no boats missing.

The coast guard said the radio messages were sent out on a frequency not generally used by ships in distress.

The tugboat Nancy Moran, towing barges off Sandy Hook near the entrance to New York harbor, first picked up the distress messages about 2:25 a.m. EDT.

They purportedly came from a point about 35 miles out to sea off Barnegat, halfway down the coastline of New Jersey and about 55 miles southeast of New York.

STRUCK LOG
The voice on the radiotelephone said the Blue Star had struck a log and that a boiler room explosion had started a fire. It said the vessel's life rafts and life jackets were being consumed by flames.

Fifteen minutes later, the Nancy Moran made contact and the voice said the Blue Star's plight was growing more desperate. She was described as having a hole in her stern and sinking rapidly. Eighteen persons were reported in the water with three still aboard.

At one point, said Capt. Mitchell C. Sullivan of the tugboat, the radio voice expressed fear that the vessel would have to go overboard. Then there was a scream and some minutes of silence.

The voice returned for the last time with its trembling, apparently terrified account of the sub's surfacing.

All American and allied submarines in the general Atlantic area were accounted for.

FIND LIFE JACKET
Searchers did find an orange life jacket bobbing in the sea about 10 miles south of where the Blue Star was reported in distress. But it bore no markings to tie it to such a vessel.

An oil slick was sighted in the same area. However, U.S. coast guard officials said such a slick need not necessarily denote a tragedy.

Seasoned seafarers heard the weird message as it was beamed their way by radio telephone. But there was mounting evidence that it was nothing but a fantastic hoax.

A vast air and sea search of 3,700 square miles of calm Atlantic waters failed to produce any concrete evidence to back up the marine drama so vividly described by the voice crying out in the night.

Last word received from a vessel identifying itself as the 40-foot fishing boat, Blue Star, was the agitated cry:

"A submarine is surfacing about 350 yards from us. It is coming alongside. It is proceeding to take survivors aboard. It is not an American submarine."

Then a pause, and the voice trailed off with the words:

"I don't think they'll let me talk any more."

After that silence and, despite hours of intensive search, no trace of any disabled fishing craft or its occupants.
