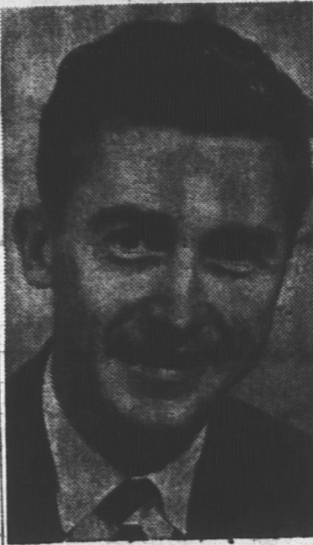

## MacKay, Kipping Have Resigned

The resignations were confirmed yesterday by Wendall MacKay, general manager of the Island Development Company, and assistant manager, Eric Kipping. Mr. MacKay stated last night that his plans for the future were indefinite. Mr. Kipping was in Halifax and will return today.

Island Development Company, whose interests up to now included Shed Acres, a large farm holding, have decided to liquidate their agricultural division immediately, and, according to Mr. MacKay, will now find themselves "top heavy in the administrative department." The only remaining large concern of the company is the Charlottetown Hotel, which will have a professional manager as soon as possible, according to Mr. MacKay. He blamed the tight-money situation for the company's action.

Island directors of the company include, J. David Stewart, J. Philip Matheson and E.W. Johnstone, owner of Woodleigh Replicas.

Mr. MacKay was previously employed as private secretary to the then premier Walter R. Shaw while Mr. Kipping was general manager of the Charlottetown Board of Trade before joining Island Development Company.

## Farm Income Reported Down

OTTAWA — A cut-back in total returns for potatoes was largely responsible for a decline in farm cash receipts in Prince Edward Island in the second quarter of the year.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports that P.E.I. receipts were \$9,546,000 in the April to June period this year compared to \$11,882,000 in the corresponding period of 1965 and \$9,509,000 for 1964.

For the first six months of the year, the P.E.I. receipts were \$19,412,000, this year compared to \$21,986,000 and \$15,051,000 to the end of June 1965 and 1964.

P.E.I. was one of three provinces which had lower receipts in the first half of the year, the others being New Brunswick and Saskatchewan.

Prices of a year earlier, prices were down quite substantially with the result that total receipts from potatoes dropped from \$53.6 million to \$39.4 million.

In P.E.I. alone, potato receipts totalled \$8,497,000 to the end of June this year compared to \$12,865,000 for the corresponding period last year and \$6,749,000 in 1964.

P.E.I.'s receipts, this year include \$9,165,000 in crops; \$10,076,000 in livestock and products; \$154,000 in maple products; \$17,000 in deficiency payments and \$34,000 in supplementary dairy payments.
