CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

The bidding:

Opening lead—king of diamonds.

A delicate problem of defense is posed in this hand, where South undertook a contract of four spades.

A three spade rebid by South, over two notrump, would have more accurately described his relatively light opening bid.

West led the king of diamonds and declarer could see there was no legitimate way to make the contract. There were a spade, two hearts, and a diamond to lose. The only possible hope was that the defense might slip up.

So declarer played the nine of diamonds from dummy, permitting the king to hold. West thereupon led the ten of clubs

and the contract was now home. South won with the ace and returned a diamond. When West played low, dummy's jack was finessed. A heart loser was then discarded on the ace of diamonds. Subsequently, declarer lost a spade and a heart and made four spades.

Had West shifted to a heart at trick two, the contract would have been beaten. Two rapid heart tricks would fix declarer's wagon beyond repair. Our discussion concerns itself with the proper play for West to make at trick two.

A diamond return is out of the question, since it is obvious that declarer is planning to discard a loser on the A-J combination. The choice of plays rests between a heart and a club.

Of course, there is the old bro-mide of how dangerous it is to lead away from a king. It might therefore be argued that the club lead is more "safe." But this argument falls when the hand as a whole is considered.

East cannot very well have the A-Q of clubs on the bidding. It would leave declarer with 4 or 5 high cards to justify his bids. Nor can it be properly assumed that declarer has both missing aces, because in such case the contract is unbeatable.

West should therefore play his partner for an ace, and since four spades cannot be defeated if East has the ace of clubs, but may be beaten if East has the ace of hearts, he should lead a heart.

Enthusiastic Reaction Reported In Housing

 OTTAWA CP — Canada's housing industry, slowed recently by a shortage of mortgage funds, has reacted with enthusiasm to the latest transference of federal money.

Since Sept. 1 the government has been making direct loans to builders for small home construction. Officials now indicate the program already has exceeded expectations.

When Prime Minister Diefenbaker announced the plan in July he said the government hoped it would lead to construction of 10,000 new homes.

Officials of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation report that at Sept. 18, loan applications had been approved covering 9,685 units. Applications were being processed at the rate of 1,300 units a week.

"We would be very surprised if the figure doesn't go to at least 15,000," said one official.

 Loan applications will be received until Dec. 31, and the number of requests for the loans undoubtedly will depend on the availability of normal mortgage loans as the fall season progresses.

The main limiting factor is a stipulation that a single builder can get no more than 15 loans. Persons close to the construction industry report that in the weeks before the federal loan program went into effect, new mortgage loans were most difficult of come by.

With a ceiling on six per cent interest maximum on National Housing Act mortgages, many lenders preferred to invest money elsewhere at a better return. Rates on non-NHA first mortgages are reported to range around 7 and 7½ per cent.

The tight money situation has been a major factor in the declining rate of starts on new homes. Figures covering towns and cities of over 5,000 population show that during the January-August period, new housing starts declined to 66,800 units from the record rate of 97,054 a year earlier. Starts in August fell to 10,266 from 12,115 a year earlier.

These statistics cover about 80 per cent of housing activity in the country.

New National Housing Act mortgages granted in August declined to 3,796—less than half the 7,874 in August, 1958.

A senior government official said that despite the decline, new housing starts for the full year are expected to be around 135,000.

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP)—Mrs. J. T. Coombes of Saint John Thursday added her observations to those of others who claim to have seen flashing lights in the skies during the last few days.

Air Defence Command at St. Hubert, Que. outside Montreal said Wednesday a flaming object that could have been a space rocket had been sighted by the RCAF Tuesday night about 150 miles east of Goose Bay Labrador.
