U. C. Presbytery Hears Talk On Education

A special meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, The United Church of Canada was held Tuesday in Heartz Hall, Charlottetown, to consider various aspects of the educational problem in the province. An address by Mr. K.A. Parker, Superintendent of City Schools, provided the center around which most of the discussion centered.

Mr. Parker suggested that we have just begun to get at the real problems of education in this province. "We ought not," he said, "to interpret the large attendances at the Education Committee hearings as necessarily indicating a real interest in education at all. Some came," he said, "to watch the clash of personalities; others because of the religious controversy. The real problems of education," he maintained, "had not been adequately touched as yet, and were not taking the real interest of the people of the province."

Mr. Parker noted the difficulties brought about because of lack of adequate cooperation on the part of those actually charged with the carrying out of the educational program in the province and those in administrative positions. Intelligent, dynamic leadership is needed on the local level on all educational matters, he said.

Mr. Parker expressed regret that briefs presented to the Committee on Education had not dealt more with the real problems of education in the province. Side issues or secondary issues had many times been given the spotlights, and matters like larger school units, better trained teachers

THE EGG AND HEALTH

The egg is one of our health protective foods. Here's a food rich in protein and also valuable minerals and vitamins. Among other minerals found within the egg, the yolk is rich in iron — a blood builder. Most of the vitamins except C are snuggled inside that protective shell. And it also contains a good amount of easily digestible fat. Because the egg contains essentials for growth and health, children should have a least 4 or 5 a week; adults 3.

Eggs can become part of the diet in many tasty ways. Consult your cookbook and pick your preferred

ences. And during the Lenten season many homemakers can solve menu problems by calling upon eggs as a substitute for meat. It's a good idea too, for the poultryman's wife to serve more eggs when the price drops. But it is also wise for her and her family to keep up consumption when prices rise. The higher egg prices are still usually lower than meat costs. Eggs give full value for their money. Serve them regularly.

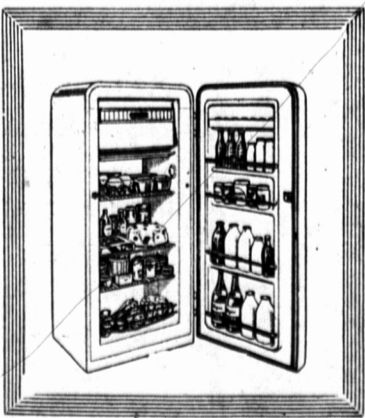

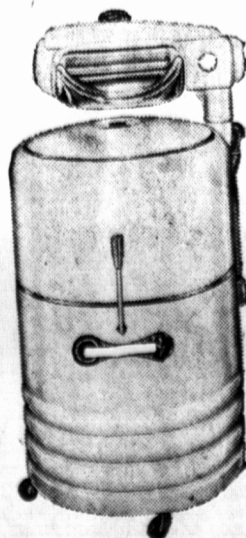

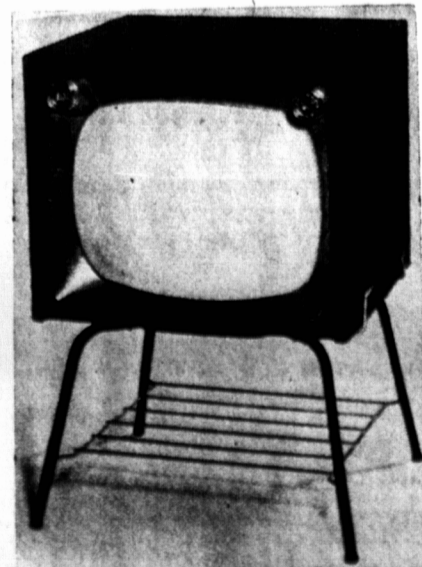
