Calgarians presented to HRH Princess Margaret were the following: Mrs. Mary Mooney, daughter of the lieutenant-governor of Alberta shared honors in making the visit of Her Royal Highness, The Princess Margaret a memorable one. In the receiving line at the state dinner Monday evening, Mrs. Mooney chose a flame silk chiffon gown.

Mrs. Manning wore a Dresden blue gown when she was official hostess at the dinner in the Alhambra Room, Banff Springs Hotel, when her husband Premier E.C. Manning and the executive council entertained the princess. With her husband, and the Lieutenant-Governor, Dr. J.J. Bowlen and Mrs. Mary Mooney, she received 150 invited guests.

The first to greet the Queen's sister on her arrival in Alberta was Mrs. D.S. Harkness, wife of the Hon. Mr. Harkness, minister of agriculture who represented the federal government in looking after Her Royal Highness during her Alberta tour. Mrs. Harkness wore a stunning cocktail gown of copper lace over gold satin. Mrs. Harkness has many relatives in Prince Edward Island. Representatives of the provincial and federal governments, the judiciary services and foreign governments were among guests invited to the state dinner and among those from Calgary who were presented to the Princess were: Mrs. E.J. McDill, wife of the U.S. Consul; Mrs. R.L. Ellis, wife of the MLA for High River (with the Calgary group); Mrs. C. Campbell McLaurin, wife of Chief Justice, trial division, Supreme Court of Alberta; Mrs. Hugh John MacDonald, wife of Liberal member in the provincial government; and Mrs. Eldon Williams, wife of the Conservative member in the federal government.
