For the 1700 fans packed into the Charlottetown Forum Monday night, there was an exciting night of hockey. The Gander Junior Flyers, a melting pot of Junior and Juvenile players (mostly Junior from their appearance) showed precision passing and positional play to drop the local Juvenile and Midget All-Stars 5-3.

The newbies certainly showed the effect that ten games can have on a club. They seemed to know just where to pass the puck and there were very few occasions when there was not at least one forward open to take the release pass. The Charlottetown team on the other hand seemed to have their problems early in the game. Playing as a unit for only the second time a good number of their passes in the first half of the game went astray but in the closing half they were beginning to click.

Gander concentrated on playing the man on defense and the defensive corps, led by Mullet proved adept at taking the puck carrier out of the play. The Juveniles on the other hand seemed to shy away from the heavy going in the opening stages of the game but hit with authority in the latter stages of the tilt.

The one problem that the locals seemed to have the most was clearing the puck from their own end. At one point they had a man advantage only to have Gander completely hem them in with four men and then, to add insult to injury, score. However this will come with more games and on the whole the Juveniles looked fairly good. They seemed to have had luck around the Gander net and a good deal of the time shot high rather than low. As the Gander goal was a standup type of net and these shots did not test him too severely.

All in all it was a good game to watch and there were very few people who left the rink before the game ended. This Saturday the Midget All-Stars will be hosting a team from the Mainland and if the game is half as exciting as Monday's it should be worth seeing.

Canadian George Chuvalo Takes Big Blow To Plans

LONDON (AP)—Eduardo Corlelli, an Argentine fighting out of Rome, Tuesday night outpointed George Chuvalo of Toronto, the fourth-ranked challenger for Cassius Clay's heavy-weight boxing title, in an upset victory over 10 rounds.

Corlelli stepped into the ring without a rating in the world's top 10 fighters and weighing 191½ pounds against Chuvalo's 206½.

A crowd of about 6,000 expected Chuvalo to bulldoze his way to victory over the fast-moving Corlelli.

But the Argentine proved the faster in the ring, danced his way out of trouble, as the bull-like Chuvalo bored in, and shrugged off most of the two-handed punches which the Canadian chose to throw.

The Associated Press made the first, fourth and 10th rounds even; the second, third, seventh, eighth went to Corlelli; the other rounds were given to the Canadian.

Chuvalo started the fight with two punches that looked a bit low. He was warned for fouling towards the end of the round.

Chuvalo threw in everything he had in the fourth round, but Corlelli's speed kept him out of serious trouble.

In the last round Chuvalo—as he had done for most of the fight—stormed in and got in a good right. But Corlelli weathered that one and then got in two lefts in return.

The crowd gave both fighters a fine ovation.

DAMAGED CHANCES The loss damaged Chuvalo's chances for a crack at Henry Cooper's British Empire title and the world championship held by Cassius Clay.

In another fight, Cooper, 31, knocked out Hubert Hilton of Glen Cove, N.Y., with a left hook after one minute, 30 seconds of the second round in a scheduled 10-rounder.

Cooper weighed 192½ pounds and Hilton 194½ pounds.

Hilton ranked ninth challenger for Clay's title. Cooper is not currently rated among the top 10.

Chuvalo and his manager, Irving Ungerman, agreed afterwards the defeat was a disappointment and might cause more difficulty getting a fight with Cooper or Clay.

"We won't call it a set-back," Ungerman said. "It won't stop us looking for Cooper and Clay. "George is a good draw. If it had been anyone else in the ring tonight against Corlelli, you wouldn't have had as good a fight as you got."

Corlelli was "pretty shifty," but the Argentine's jabs did not hurt. "I'd like nothing better than a rematch," Chuvalo said.

"If Corlelli had stood up and fought like a man, I would have beaten him," Chuvalo said. "But he kept going back, back, back. "I guess this has set back my program for a challenge against Clay, but that is still our objective."

Dream Team Is Selected; Wings, Hawks Dominate

MONTREAL (CP) — Players from Chicago Black Hawks and Detroit Red Wings captured nine of the 12 positions on the National Hockey League's mid-season all-star poll, the league announced recently.

Montreal Canadiens placed one player on both squads, while Toronto Maple Leafs had one man selected to the second team. New York Rangers and Boston Bruins drew a blank in the voting.

Bobby Hull, Chicago's powerful leftwinger, was one of three Chicago players chosen for the first team. Hull was the only unanimous choice of the selectors.

The voting, based on five points for a first-place choice, three for a second and one for a third, was conducted among sportswriters and broadcasters in the six league cities.

Glenn Hall, Chicago's veteran netminder, was named to the first team, garnering 84 of a possible 90 points, while goalie Roger Crozier of Detroit gained the second team with 54 points.

PICK HAD DEFENCEMAN Jacques Laperriere of Montreal and Pierre Pilote, the Hawks' veteran captain, were

named as the first team's defencemen. Laperriere polled the same number of votes as Hall, 84, while Pilote picked up 64—seven more than Detroit's Doug Barkley. Toronto's Allan Stanley was named Barkley's partner on the second team.

Norm Ullman, Detroit's classy centre, edged Chicago's Stan Mikita 64-57 for the first team nomination for that position.

Players on the second team —Barkley, Rousseau and Mohs

are named all-stars for the first time. Laperriere, Pilote, Ullman and Hull are holdovers from the 1964-65 first-all-star team. Crozier was selected to the first team last season, while Howe was on the second squad.

Howe had been named to 18 all-star squads in the past—eight times as a member of the first team and the same number of appearances for the second squad.

PWC Stages Comeback To Capture Thriller 7-6

Prince of Wales Welshmen after having fallen behind 5-2 at the end of the second period literally exploded for five goals in the third last coming with only 1 second to play and edged the Saint Dunstan's High School aggregation 7-6 in one of the fastest and most thrilling games to be seen at the Forum this season. Andy Arsenault climaxed the Welshmen's efforts as he took passes from Doherty and Kennedy to give the college the win.

Jamie Kennedy, having just arrived home from Boston yesterday led the Welshmen as he scored four big markers, three of them coming in the third period when the pressure was on. He also had an assist. Arsenault had one goal, the big one as far as the books are concerned, and added an assist on Merrill Stretch's goal. Tuppy Rogers scored the remaining PWC tally. For the Saints Billy MacKinnon dented the twines thrice for the hat trick and Cecil MacDonald, Bill Weatherbie and Alan Flood accounted for the rest.

Play had no sooner started in the first period when the Welshmen missed what seemed to be a sure goal and that was the story of the period. The Saints were all over them in each end of the rink and their efforts paid off at the 17:00 mark when MacDonald opened the scoring. Ellis made a beautiful glove save but juggled the puck and when he dropped it MacDonald was there to bang it in.

The Welshmen seemed to have a few defensive problems in this opening stanza and some brilliant netminding by Ellis was the main reason the period ended 1-0 for SDHS. He felled Alan Flood on a breakaway at the 15:00 mark and time and time again he stopped numerous shots in a row.

SAINTS' SECOND Bill MacKinnon gave the Saints a two goal margin at the 1:55 mark of the second as he let loose the rebound of a Billy LeClair shot and beat Ellis with a short shot. PWC got back within range as Arsenault made a perfect pass from the corner to stretch in front of the net. He banged in his shot, from about ten feet out, past the surprised Brown, into the upper left hand corner.

The Saints began what was to be a familiar procedure in the first part of the game as they swarmed back less than a minute later and went back out in front by two goals. Alan Flood gathering speed on the left wing cut in sharply and tested Ellis with a severe backhand. The de-Clair shot and was absent again and Billy Weatherbie had little more to do than slip the puck into the open corner.

Kennedy got his only solo goal of the evening at the 13:37 mark when he was completely behind

the SDHS net. Jamie shot the puck out and it deflected in off the back of Brown's leg. Despite this effort the Saints swarmed back and 33 seconds later the puck was again in the net only this time behind Ellis. Alan Flood followed Kennedy's example and attempted a pass from behind the PWC cage. The pass hit Carl Duncan's skate and glanced in past a surprised Ellis.

SDHS rounded out the terrific second with their fifth goal and appeared to be on their way to an old fashioned rout. Bill MacKinnon after having taken a Cecil MacDonald pass beat Ellis with another 10 footer to round out the scoring. PWC CAMEBACK The Welshmen opened the scoring in the third at the 2:35 mark as Kennedy took a pass from Barry Turner at center ice, cut to the right wing and beat Brown with a low 20 foot shot. However the Saints felled their pattern as MacKinnon scored his third on a scramble goal 31 seconds later and gave SDHS a 6-3 lead.

However, unknown to fans

and players at that time, this was the end of the road for the high schoolers. Tuppy Rogers ignited the PWC charge at the 7:55 mark as he stole the puck from a SDHS rearguard and beat Brown with a low backhand shot. Jamie Kennedy put the collegiates one goal away at 10:47 as he banged in a Carl Duncan pass from the left corner of the crease on a power play effort.

Playing shorthanded the Welshmen continued to apply the pressure and it paid off at the 15:05 mark when Jamie Kennedy got a partial break and was hauled down by Alan Flood. Kennedy had been robbed by Brown less than two minutes before but this time he made no mistake as he was awarded a penalty shot by referees Don Whelan and Joe Coyle. Kennedy diked Brown, slipped the puck under him and the score was finally tied.

Student goalies again caught the attention of the approximately 1,300 fans in the closing few minutes. Ellis robbed Bill LeClair as he was all alone and got

a big boost as Dennis Affleck hit the post with about a minute left. Arsenault finally put the PWC fans in ecstasy with one fleeting second remaining as he converted a Kennedy pass into the winning goal.

The refereeing team of Whelan and Coyle called a total of twenty infractions, seven of which went to the winners. The win left PWC at the head of the league with a 6-1 record while the Saints are 6-2.

Habs, Chicago Watch Scores

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Members of Montreal Canadiens and Chicago Black Hawks shouldn't be faulted if they indicate more than casual interest in the out-of-town scoreboard when the two teams meet in a National Hockey League game in Montreal tonight.

The Hawks and Canadiens—locked in second spot in the league race with 47 points—will be watching for the outcome of Detroit Red Wings' game at New York against the fifth-place Rangers.

Detroit leads the second-place pair by four points and shows no sign of slowing the pace that has netted them 20 wins, four losses and one tie in their last 25 outings. The Wings are riding a nine-game unbeaten streak on the strength of eight wins and one tie.

Against the Rangers the Wings have won four times, tied three and dropped one game this season.

The Rangers, ousted from the Madison Square Garden by an ice show last week, returned from their five-game road trip with one win, one tie and three consecutive losses.

The slump allowed last-place Boston Bruins to creep to within two points of New York.

Emile Francis, Rangers' coach and general manager, says his club has been plagued all season by lack of consistency, which has resulted in the general decline from a hot start to a pathetic mid-season lethargy.

In contrast, the Wings have been getting fine performances from several of their players.

Roger Crozier, their netminder, leads the league in shutouts with seven, while left-winger Paul Henderson tops the scorers in game-winning counters with eight of his 15 goals deciding the outcome.
