



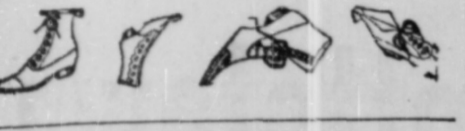

**LARGEST IN THE WORLD.**—The Great Northern Railroad claims to have the largest locomotive in the world, it is of the twelve-wheeled mastodon type, with cylinders 34 by 21 inches, drivers 55 inches, in diameter. Its total weight is 212,750 pounds, and the total weight of engine and tender 308,750 pounds. It is for heavy freight service on the Montana division of the Great Northern Railroad, and will weigh, in running condition, over 106 tons. The length of the engine is 41 feet 4 inches over all, and the distance from the rail to the top of the smokestack is 15 1/2 feet.
