

Large Crowd, Good Racing At Driving Park On Saturday

Royal Value, owned by Walter Hennessey of Charlottetown and driven by Joe Hennessey, paced the fastest mile in the Maritimes this season when he won the second dash of the feature race at the Charlottetown Driving Park in 2:10 on Saturday night.

Johnnie Kalmuck won the opening dash of the feature race by moving up from sixth place to the rail in the stretch to pace under the wire a half length ahead of Royal Value and Direct Mite.

Don Seaman drove Waymark to an easy and surprising win in the final dash of the night. Waymark trotted a great mile in moving up from fifth place at the half to beat Flaxscott and Mary Merk by two lengths at the wire.

Supporters of Waymark and Seaman reaped their benefits at the pari-mutuel wickets. A win ticket on Waymark paid the handsome sum of \$78.10.

There was a large crowd present to witness what was undoubtedly the best opening night show staged here since night racing was inaugurated.

Little Delbert, owned by James O'Brien of Elmsdale and driven by Earl Semple, won the first and fifth dashes. Ann's Boy won the fourth dash and Gahagan the seventh. Mary Merk trotted her way to a win in the third dash.

Royal Value led away at the pole and led from the wire as he paced the mile in 2:10. Lucky Chief moved up fast in the stretch to finish a half length behind.

Walter Kelly drove a fine race as he piloted Johnnie Kalmuck to victory in the first dash of the feature. Johnnie was in last position as he turned onto the stretch but he paced down along the rail to sneak through and win by half a length.

Little Delbert, the only double dash winner on the card, nosed out Money Royal at the wire after a stirring stretch duel to win the first dash. Money Royal led most of the race.

Money Royal again set the pace in the fifth dash but Little Delbert moved up from third place to win. Dale B. came on strong for the last quarter and finished second a nose behind Little Delbert.

Earl Semple had Mary Merk out front from wire to wire in winning the first dash of the trot. Flaxscott finished second and Winnie's Last third.

In the eighth dash Mary Merk again took over leadership during the early part of the race followed by Arionway and Flaxscott. Don Seaman, driving Waymark, pulled out his horse at the half and battled it out with Mary Merk on the back stretch.

Waymark moved ahead as the horses hit the stretch and he came trotting down the stretch a

good winner by two lengths in a fine finish.

Ann's Boy was an easy winner in the fourth dash as Ensor Bowness reined the strong son of Calumet Budlong to a wire to wire victory. Miss Donna Mae, paced a strong mile to finish second.

In the seventh dash Elwood Times drove Gahagan to the top at the three-eighth pole and stayed out front to win by a comfortable margin over the fast finishing Ann's Boy.

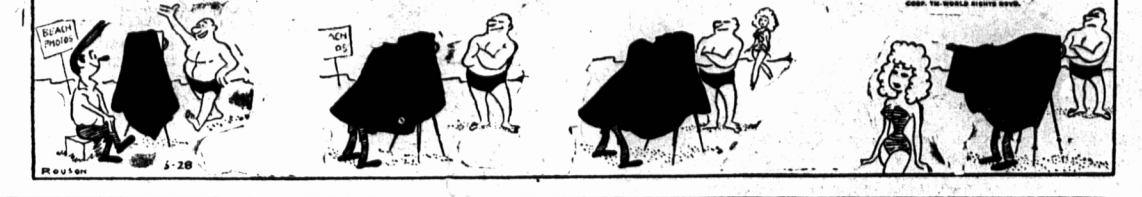

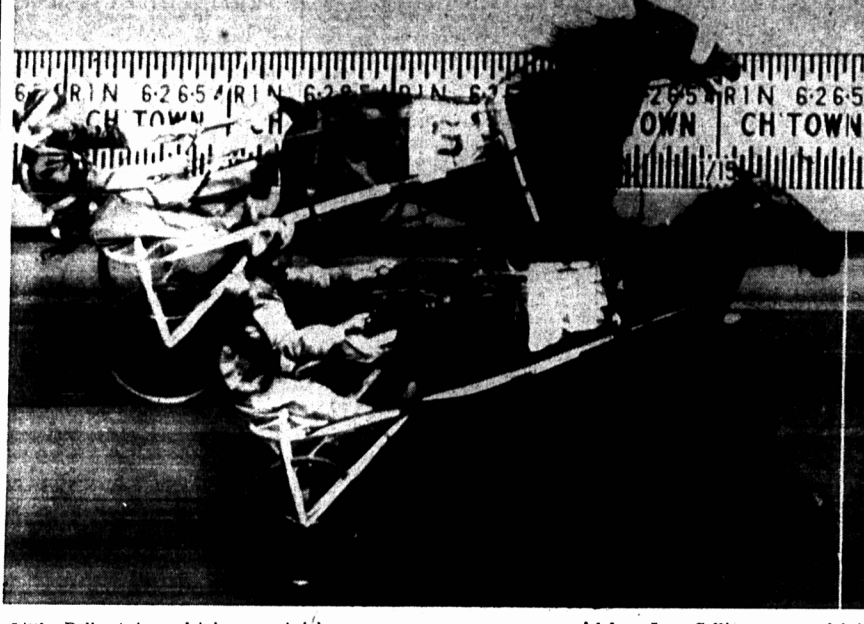

CHARLOTTETOWN DRIVING PARK

Hold Maritime Wildlife Convention At Pictou

PICTOU, N.S. (CP)—The Maritime Wildlife Convention during the week end unanimously passed a resolution urging the Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island governments to adopt the National Rifle Association's hunter safety plan.

The resolution recommended the governments set up legislation for compulsory licensing of all bearers of fire-arms, and compulsory tests of all applicants for hunting licenses younger than 21.

NRA secretary Frank Daniel, Washington, D.C., and John Dodge, conservation educator for New Hampshire, outlined the plan to the 100 registered members of the New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island fish and game associations attending their first annual joint convention here.

Mr. Daniel said basic cause of hunting accidents was "ignorance that borders on the abysmal." He said adoption of the NRA four-hour demonstration course in fire-arms handling had cut down teen-age accidents radically in one year.

Mr. Dodge expected the plan had been adopted in schools, and how school teachers were trained by the New Hampshire education department to become qualified NRA instructors.

The convention advocated an insurance plan to cover personal liability, personal injuries, or death, and loss or damage to equipment. The insurance plan would be limited to association members.

They also accepted an offer of the National Wildlife Association to sell wild life stamps through the provincial associations. The primary purpose of the stamps was said to be educating youngsters to become good sportsmen.

Delegates heard Harvey Moore of Milltown Cross, P.E.I. tell how he bands wild ducks and geese that land on his private sanctuary near Montserrat, P.E.I. He said last year he banded about 400 of the birds as they ate from his hand.

Dr. John Bulger, north eastern field representative of the National Wildlife Federation at Washington, D.C., said that in the U.S. more money was spent on hunting dogs alone than was spent on baseball, football, basketball, horse-racing and prize fights put together. He said hunters and fishermen spent more than \$25,000,000 a day altogether.
