The Budget Debate.

Mr. McKenzie Fails to Finish His Speech!

HOME RULE PETITION Conservative Victory.

Special to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 8. Numerous petitions are being presented to the House of Commons against amending the Canada Temperance Act, 1878.

Mr. Plumb, M. P., in the House of Commons yesterday, resumed the debate on the budget. He said the imbecility, blundering, and reckless extravagance of the McKenzie-Blake Administration increased the public debt thirty seven million dollars.

Hon. Mr. McKenzie followed. He contrasted the respective financial policies of his and the present Government; compared the expenditures; discussed the theories of protection and free trade; and, after speaking about one hour, during which Sir Albert Smith slept, and Sir Richard and Mr. Blake absented themselves, his voice failed and he resumed his seat.

Sir Leonard Tilley offered to adjourn the debate, in order to give Mr. McKenzie another chance to speak.

Mr. Conroy replied to Kinfret, and ably supported the National Policy.

Mr. Charlton adjourned the debate.

Mr. Loupore (Conservative) has been elected to fill the vacancy in Pontiac. The reaction is terrible.

Mr. O'Sullivan intends moving a resolution in the Commons, asking Parliament to petition Her Majesty the Queen to grant self government to Ireland, and release the Irish suspects now in British prisons.

Mr. Wallace moves in the Commons to extend the franchise throughout the whole Dominion, and make the voter's qualification the same as in Prince Edward Island.

GENERAL NEWS.

HALIFAX, March 7.

This morning while the steamer Corroll was being backed out of her dock one of the deck hands lost one of his legs. He was paying out a hawser which was attached to the wharf pile, when the rope got beyond his control, and his leg catching in a bight of the hawser, was torn completely off just below the knee. The man was carried twice around the windlass, and his screams were terrible. He was taken to the Hospital, and it is hoped he will recover.

BOSTON, March 7.

Mrs. Harriet Bell, tailoress, thirty-six years old, living on Kirkland street, was followed to her house by an elderly stranger, this morning, and stabbed to death. He has not been arrested yet; but a vigorous search is being made for him.

WASHINGTON, March 7.

Senor Martinez, Chilean Minister, has received no official announcement of the signing of a protocol, alleged by private despatches to have been agreed upon by U. S. Minister Tresscott and the Chilean Minister of Foreign Affairs.

LONDON, March 7.

The death is announced of the Earl of Wilton, aged 81.

The election at Malvern today, to fill the vacancy in the Commons caused by the death of Walter Powell, Conservative, resulted in the return of Colonel Mills, Conservative.

In the House of Lords to-day a resolution introduced by the Earl of Rosdale excluding Atheists from both Houses of Parliament was read for the first time.

WINNIPEG, March 7.

John Taylor's house, at Meadow Lea, was burned during the storm of Saturday. His wife and three daughters are now frozen to death, and Taylor's hands and feet are badly frozen. Ives Reed, a visitor, was slightly frozen. The storm was the severest ever known here.

LONDON, March 7.

The race between Lagan and Gookin, for £100 a side, came off to-day, over the Thames Championship Course, and was won by Lagan, by two lengths, after a good race. A foul occurred under Hamersmith Bridge, which was decided in Lagan's favor.

NIAGARA FALLS, March 7.

Mr. E. F. Clements, of Yarmouth, N. S., jumped from the second story of the Niagara House, early this morning and broke both legs. Temporary aberration was the cause.

BELGRADE, March 7.

Germany and Italy have recognized the Kingdom.

ODESSA, March 7.

Arrests of very important nihilists were made here lately, and a secret press discovered.

Among the passengers who crossed at the Capes to-day were Major Freeland, Mr. L. W. Watson, J. R. Calhoun, Angus McMillan, and A. L. Bridges.

SEVEN boats, with twenty-four passengers, and one hundred and twenty-three bags of mail left Cape Tormentine for Cape Traverse this morning at 8.15 and arrived at 2.15 p. m.

The "Northern Light" has not been heard of since she was reported off Cape Sharp.

Astronomical Facts.

THE POSITIONS OF THE PLANETS THIS MONTH—URANUS IN PERHELION.

(Providence Journal.)

Uranus is the evening star after the 6th of March, on which date it is in opposition with the sun at 11 p. m. He may now be found on any clear moonless night. Those who have star maps can mark his exact position on the chart, and will find him in a line with Regulus, the brilliant star in the handle of the Sickle, and forming nearly a right-angled triangle with Regulus and Denebola, a star of the second magnitude in the tail of Leo. About 9 o'clock is a favourable time for observation, as Leo is then halfway between the horizon and the zenith. Uranus reaches his perihelion on the 25th. This event takes place but once in eighty-four years. At perihelion Uranus is 168,000,000 miles nearer the sun than at aphelion, and as the present perihelion and opposition occur within nineteen days of each other, he is about the same distance nearer the earth. But though approaching us by a space of which figures give no idea, his nearer neighborhood will change its appearance but a slight degree. Uranus now rises about 11 minutes after 6 o'clock in the evening; at the end of the month he sets a few minutes after 4 o'clock in the morning. Mercury is the only planet that is morning star throughout the month. He is most distant from the sun on the 21st and will be a charming object in the morning sky after the middle of the month and before its close. He rises now at a quarter before 6 o'clock, and at the close of the month will rise at 5. Saturn is evening star. He sets now at half-past 10 o'clock, and at the close of the month will set about quarter before 6. Neptune is evening star, but is invisible to the naked eye. Jupiter is evening and presents a very brilliant aspect. Jupiter sets at half-past 11 o'clock in the morning; at the close of the month he sets at 10 o'clock. Mars is evening star, and presents few features to attract attention. He sets a few minutes after 3 o'clock in the morning, and at the close of the month will set a few minutes before 2. Venus is evening star, but only eight days past her superior conjunction with the sun, and still so near him as to be completely hidden in his rays. But, although now invisible, she has entered on the grand career as evening star, which will end in her inferior conjunction on the 6th of December, when the grand astronomical event of the year may be expected, as she makes her transit or passage over the sun's disc. Careful observers may possibly discover her at the end of the month, for she is then about three-quarters of an hour above the horizon after sunset. Venus sets now a few minutes before 6 o'clock, just after sunset. At the close of the month she sets a few minutes after 7 o'clock.

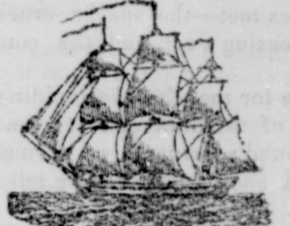
