Tignish Meeting Sees Need For New School

TIGNISH — The need for a new elementary school in Tignish was the main topic of discussion at the annual ratemakers' meeting in School District 115 Tuesday night. Although the question was not voted on, all those who spoke on the subject stated they felt the need was apparent.

Both elementary schools are reported crowded with one class being housed in the regional high school, and a second class sited for accommodation in that building next fall.

The meeting voted \$500 next year, along with \$2,700 rent and supplies for the Dalton School. These amounts would include \$4,175 for 13 school teachers.

School Basement To Be Used For Recreational Purposes

ALBERTON — The annual meeting of ratemakers of Alberton Elementary School District was held Tuesday evening with the chairman of the board of trustees, John Rochford, presiding.

The secretary, Mrs. Blanche England, gave the financial report and also the supervisor's report which included a recommendation for more library books.

The amount paid to Alberton Regional High School was raised slightly and now stands at \$5,000.

It was decided to make use of the large school basement for recreation and possibly other purposes and a concrete floor, stairways and a fire escape are to be installed.

Mrs. England informed the meeting that the final payment on the old elementary school was made recently amounting to \$300. The old school building, which was located on South Main Street was sold two years ago to Alberton Industries building firm.

The sum of \$11,200 was budgeted for the coming year.

Everett Shea was elected a trustee to serve the remaining term of the late Stephen H. Burke, and Richard Jeffrey, Jr. was elected to replace retiring trustee, John Rochford. The third member of the board is Reginald Travers.

The auditors' report was read by Mrs. Everett Shea who was re-appointed for another term.

His letter to Macmillan, dated Tuesday, said:

"To my very deep regret, I have to admit that I misled you and my colleagues, and the House of Commons.

"I ask you to understand that I did this to protect, as I thought, my wife and my family, who were equally misled, as were my professional advisers.

"I have come to realize that, by deception, I have been guilty of a grave misdemeanour."

He went on to deny any suggestion that he kept Miss Keeler away from the Old Bailey as a witness or that he might have been involved in a security breach.

Profumo said that he also would leave Parliament.

James Ramaden, undersecretary at the war office, will take charge of the war ministry until a new minister is appointed.

Profumo entered the Commons in 1949 when he was a soldier of 25, and was for some time its youngest member.

He made steady progress toward high office — becoming minister of state for foreign affairs in 1949 and finally secretary of state for war in July, 1960.
