

Dodgers Lose To Pirates; Lead Braves By Half Game

PITTSBURGH (AP)—A two-run homer by Frank Thomas, his 23rd of the season, joined Brooklyn's ational League pennant drive Friday night as the sixth-place Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the Dodgers 2-1. The loss trimmed Brooklyn's first-place edge to half game over Milwaukee, play-

ing a night game with the Chicago Cubs. Thomas' long poke in the seventh inning, clearing the left field wall, came with one out following a leadoff double by Bill Virdon—only the third hit allowed to that point by righthander Sal Maglie.

Maglie, taking his fifth defeat in 16 decisions, had won six in a row. Ron Kline rode in on the homer for his 14th victory against 16de-feats. The 24-year-old righthander who hadn't beaten the Dodgers in three previous decisions this year, gave eight hits.

Gil Hodges' double, a pair of infield outs and Junior Gilliam's single to deep short scored the Brooklyn run in the top of the seventh. In the eighth, Kline got in a hole with two out when Randy Jackson, playing third base for the injured Jackie Robinson, walked and Sandy Amoros followed with a single. But Kline then put a called third strike past pinch-hitter Rube Walker on a 3-2 pitch.

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Giants pounded on rookie righthander Dick Farrell and Ron Negray for seven runs in the 5th inning and defeated the Phillies 7-3 Friday night. Southpaw Johnny Antonelli went to the Phillies to seven hits while fanning seven and walking three. There was one homerun, by rookie outfielder Bob Bowman of the Phillies. It was Bowman's first major league hit. Bowman also tripled to account for two of the Phillies runs.

Willie Mays of the Giants stole his 37th and 38th bases of the season, the highest number of thefts by a National Leaguer since Kiki Cuyler's 43 in 1929.

The 22-year-old Canadian enters the final today against Joanne Gunderson of Seattle, spectacular teenager who calmly knocked in a five-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole to defeat Mrs. Ann Casey Johnstone, veteran Iowa player, 1 up in the other semi-final.

Several world's records have topped in the past couple of weeks, two of them at DuQuoin, Illinois, where the two-year old filly Good Counsel paced to a win in 1:58 1-5. That was a new world's mark for a mile track, not only by a two-year old pacing mare but by a pacing mare of any age. On Wednesday last Good Counsel set up other world's records by winning in 2:01 2-5 and 2:02 4-5 at Delaware Ohio Half Mile Track. That displaced the previous world record sets by Bell Acton at Yonkers, New York, last year of 2:02 2-5. The same afternoon the two-year old trotter Bond Hanover, owned by Sol Camp, Shafter, Cal., set a half-mile track. The total time being 4:09. The previous record was made by Titan Hanover, driven by Harry Pownall, over the same track in 1944. Time 2:03 3-4, 2:05 3-4.
