Live Lobster Trade To Europe Booming

ST. ANDREWS, N.B. (CP) — Shipping live lobsters to Europe from the world's largest lobster farm at nearby Deer Island has grown into a flourishing business. Conley's Lobsters Ltd., of St. Andrews started it in 1956. December and spring are the big seasons. Sending one of two plane-loads a week, Conley's shipped about 150,000 pounds during the first 20 days of last month, mostly to Amsterdam and London. Trans-Canada Air Lines, Air France and KLM have been hired for the shipments, ranging between 6,000 and 15,000 pounds. In flight, the cardboard cartons-enclosed lobsters stay alive in wood shavings. They can be loaded at the Saint John, N.B., airport in the afternoon and on the table at Amsterdam the next morning. Conley's pioneered the overseas trade and supplies practically all the requirements, because of its unique Deer Island lobster pound or farm — and other extensive facilities.

Yank Criticizes Canadian Policy

HALIFAX (CP) — A United States weapons engineer criticizes the defence production department of a short-sighted "buy Canadian" policy in acquiring electronic equipment and says this has helped prevent the Canadian navy from becoming an effective defence force. John Gregory, attached to the electrical engineering division of the Halifax Naval Dockyard, said in a press conference Monday that Canada's new Mackenzie class destroyer escorts are already obsolete as defensive weapons. He said that much of the ship's electronic equipment is more than 10 years old. He suggested Canada can best fill her NATO role with submarines armed with Polaris missiles. Mr. Gregory has been under contract with the defence production department since September. His home is in Medfield, Mass., but he now lives in Dartmouth, N.S. He claims that Canada's defence policy is concerned "more with the political and economic advantages of issuing large shipbuilding contracts than providing the country with adequate defence weapons."

Not Informed, Ottawa Says

OTTAWA (CP) — A naval spokesman said Monday that John Gregory, an American engineer, is "something less than knowledgeable about Canadian defence policy, especially the role of the Royal Canadian Navy." He was commenting on press conference statements in Halifax by Mr. Gregory that the RCN's new Mackenzie class destroyers are obsolete and that they should be replaced by submarines. The announcement came as the UN claimed another victory in its military campaign to halt the province's secession from the rest of the Congo. The UN said Swedish troops took the railroad town of Kaniama and northwest of Elisabethville and 45 miles northwest of Kaniama, a UN military base.

NEW EARL QUILTS AS GARDENER

The Earl, Ever Frederick Cecil Hobart-Hampden, 61, explained in his letter of resignation to Southend's parks superintendent that this move was a result of consultations with his advisers. "I cannot state what my immediate future will be... I have received no direct contact with the late Earl's executors. My own soliters will be in touch with them at a later stage." Third Report Released By Glassco Commission

OTTAWA (CP) — Abandonment or sharp curtailment of other lines of federal services is recommended in the third report of the Glassco royal commission on government organization. Among other things, it bluntly advises Ottawa to: Stop operating hospitals for war veterans; halt sale of government annuities; close Royal Roads service college at Victoria; eliminate Veterans' Land Act administration; cease free operation of pleasure-boats canals. The 180,000-word report, issued Monday night by Prime Minister Diefenbaker, follows a theme introduced in the commission's second report last November. The federal government is involved in many side-line projects which could be let to the provinces or private industry. In each case it argues that each economic can be achieved with no loss of public service or efficiency, and avoids putting a total price tag on possible savings.

Key Recommendations Made In Glassco Report

- Transfer of all federal schools in the Prairies to territorial governments.
- A grant by Parliament to cover the annual deficit incurred handling second class mail.
- Abolition of free canal systems for pleasure craft in central Canada, either by charging tolls or turning canals over to provinces.
- Higher charges in national parks for admission and use of golf courses.
- Higher fees for patents, to cover current deficits and an equivalent patent office staff.
- Government study of the "heavy reliance on public relations techniques" in armed forces and public relations.
- Reorganization of external affairs department information services to provide better service to public relations Canada a more effectively abroad.
- Publication of more reports in French, with higher pay to attract more government translators.
- Development of a central staff of economists in the economic policy planning.
- Pay increases in the Dominion Bureau of Statistics to attract more government professional manpower.
- More independence for the dominion statisticians to "protect the integrity of the government's statistics."
