#### Care of Your Hands.

If you are conscious of your hands they will grow red and angry looking. If you forget them they will return to their normal color. If hands are homely in shape despite the best one can do they should be shielded with sleeves that drop over the hand.

To keep the hand smooth use a few drops of this lotion after washing: Three ounces of rosewater. One ounce of glycerine. Ten drops of carbolic acid. Ten grains of bicarbonate of soda. Cost about 20 cents.

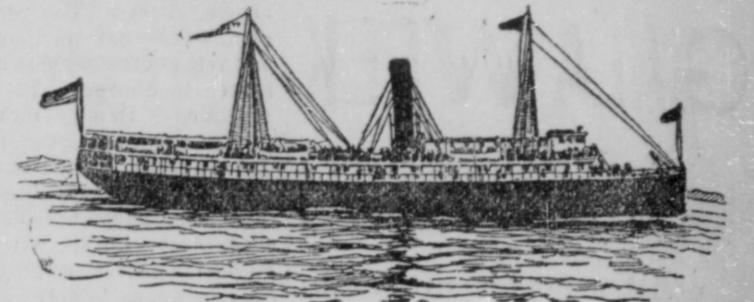
