

Look In The Refrigerator

"Early every morning a good chef reviews the contents of his refrigerator and plans to utilize all oddments during the day. This would be a good plan for our homemakers," suggested the Chef. "Perhaps there are enough oddments to put together a substantial molded loaf for a main course or lunch. Or a chef may decide to use canned fish or meat from the storeroom or pantry. Add a hot soup or vegetables to the menu and a good dessert and an excellent meal results."

All measurements are level recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6. Molden Main Dish Loaves—Actual cooking time, 10 minutes. Chicken Loaf: In the top of a double boiler, mix together 1 envelope unflavored gelatin, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. paprika and 1/2 tsp. monosodium glutamate. Beat together 1 1/2 c. milk, 2 egg yolks, 2 tsp. table mustard and 1/4 tsp. Tabasco. Stir into the gelatin mixture. Cook and stir about 10 min. over boiling water or until the gelatin dissolves and the mixture thickens slightly. Cool.

Stir in 3 tsp. cider vinegar, 2-3 c. fine-diced celery, 1-3 c. small-diced pimento and 2 packed-down, cups small - diced cooked chicken. Turn into a 3 c. loaf pan. Refrigerate 2-4 hrs. or until firm. Ham Loaf: Follow directions for chicken loaf, substituting 2 c. ground cooked or canned ham for chicken. Reduce the salt to 1/4 tsp. and substitute 1-3 c. pickle relish for pimento.

Fish Loaf: Follow directions for chicken loaf, substituting 2 c. flaked cooked tuna, salmon, crab or lobster. Reduce the salt to 1/4 tsp. and substitute 1-3 c. minced green pepper for pimento. Tomorrow's Dinner: stewed dried linas in bowls; molded ham loaf with potato chips; deviled cabbage; cottage pudding with chocolate sauce; coffee, tea or milk.

Deviled cabbage from the Chef: To a qt. of cooked, shredded cabbage, add 2 tsp. butter, 2 1/2 tsp. vinegar, 1/2 tsp. table mustard, 1/2 tsp. onion juice, 1 tsp. Worcestershire, 1/4 tsp. sugar and salt to taste.
