and spawn lobsters, then we suggest that the Department vacate the field of enforcement of our regulations and call in the R.C.M.P. to take over and carry out these duties.

Poaching Situation

There was a great deal of discussion on the subject of poaching. The Federation brief said that two factors were important: the apparent hesitancy of the protection staff to bring the culprits to court; and the general failure of the courts to do much about it when they were brought in.

Methods Obsolete

The Federation brief said that the methods used by the fishermen today were sadly obsolete and there had been little change in past 100 years. It viewed the introduction of draggers as a progressive and desirable development and thought it was the answer to the bettering of ground fishing conditions. There is a need it said, for shoal draft draggers for the North Shore.

Ineffective Fines
