Four Escape Serious Injury At Cherry Valley Corner

Four persons escaped possible serious injury yesterday afternoon when their car went into the ditch approximately one-quarter of a mile from the Cherry Valley corner on the Trans-Canada Highway.

The occupants, two young couples from Pictou, N.S., were unidentified.

The accident occurred at approximately two o'clock when the driver of the vehicle was proceeding towards Wood Islands and in attempting to pass another vehicle skidded on the soft shoulder of the highway, and ran into the ditch.

The occupants were taken to Nelson's Service Station in Cherry Valley where they were treated for various cuts and bruises and were later driven to Pictou by an employee of the service station.

The vehicle, a 1955 Monarch, was extensively damaged.

Roman Catholic Fishermen Are Arrested By State Police

 TRIVANDRUM, India (CP)—Fingering crucifixes and beads, 137 Roman Catholic fishermen and students were arrested by armed state police this evening as tension mounted in the capital of Communist-ruled Kerala state.

The mass arrest at St. Joseph's English high school coincided with shootings and clashes between anti-Communists and police in other parts of the state. Further violence may occur today when 500 government schools reopen in the Trivandrum district.

Led by a 20-year-old university student, John Fernandez, 250 men from nearby coastal villages camped in the school grounds Sunday "to protect the school" and prevent its opening today.

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS CLOSED

All Roman Catholic schools are to remain closed but there have been rumors that Communist teachers and sympathizers may try to force some to open.

Soon after their arrival, a detachment of steel-helmeted police with bayonets on their rifles rounded the men up, saying they were searching for dangerous weapons. The school was searched but no arms were discovered.

The 137 arrested were held in preventive detention. The detainees, who had brought 10 days' supply of rice, chatted with reporters, joked with each other and then filed peacefully into police vans.

As they drove off, the prisoners chanted Long Live The Liberation Struggle.

VILLAGE RALLIES

Earlier, this reporter travelled by bus 100 miles south from Kottayam, a centre of anti-Communist agitation. In nearly every village party flags were flying in preparation for mass rallies. In some communities, flags of the Congress and Socialist parties and the Muslim League were predominant; in others the Communist hammer and sickle were commonest. At all main centres, hundreds of special police were stationed.

On Saturday afternoon, large crowds, including women and children, demonstrated in villages against the government. Until Sunday, few Communist counter-demonstrations were reported.

Stunt Driving Thrills Crowd

SUMMERSIDE — Attracting a large crowd of several hundred persons the lucky Hell Drivers auto stunt show made good their claim of providing a thrilling, daring exhibition of driving skill and courage at Summerside Raceway Saturday night, but did not defy death more than did the several dozen spectators who lined the light wooden fence in front of the grandstand area where the show was presented.

Ignoring the warnings of the master-of-ceremonies and the sincere effort of members of the show to move people away from the danger areas during crucial moments in the show, these fence-side spectators, mostly teen-agers, increased in numbers along the action points causing grandstand spectators more concern for the dare-devil drivers than for the dare-devil drivers.

The crowd was considerably larger than might have been expected on a cool, windy evening, and the spectators included a few who scaled the fence at the south end of the grandstand from the back of a truck in an apparently planned commando-like entrance.

The show included a bit of comedy, and plenty of thrills including the spectacle of watching one of the stunt men drive an old car over a low ramp and intentionally cause it to roll over several times coming to rest as a heap of broken twisted metal that had to be hauled from the track after a suspenseful few minutes when other members of the show worked at the wreck to free the driver who apparently had also received a minor injury to the back of his neck.

The report is a 34-page booklet, Oil And Canada - United States Relations, written by John Davis, director of research and planning for the British Columbia Electric Company. It was prepared for the Canadian-American committee, whose aim is to study problems arising from growing interdependence between Canada and the U.S.

The committee consists of about 3 members from each country and is sponsored by the Private Planning Association of Canada and the National Planning Association (U.S.).
