## Notes and Comments.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that fifty-eight, or more than a quarter of the whole, of the members of the House of Commons are lawyers. It would be thought this would ensure that the laws would be so framed that there could be no misunderstanding them. But it will not.

"I alone am master of the country," are the Emperor William's reported words at Dusseldorf, when he was speaking of the future of Germany, upon which the Montreal Gazette remarks that a wise king might have thought it better not to put the thing so bluntly. It is calculated to make forty million Germans ponder why one German should be their uncontrolled master; and thinking of that kind is not profitable to hereditary right.

The figures seem to show that Canada does a larger trade with the outside world in proportion to population than the United States. Here are the figures as published by the Empire:

Mr. McKinley has not yet quite succeeded in crushing Canada, for although there is a slight decrease in the March exports as compared with twelve months ago, yet putting the nine months of the current fiscal year against the same period last year, the result is decidedly encouraging. The export figures are as follows: 1890 91, \$73,734,012; 1889 90, \$73,208,731. Increase, \$525,282. The imports have fallen off somewhat, but this cannot be said to be discouraging. The figures for nine months read: 1890 91, \$1,829,943; 1889 90, \$2,552,887. Decrease, \$722,944. The duty collected in the two periods was as follows: 1890 91, \$17,081,532; 1889 90, \$17,944,503. Decrease, \$862,971.

The total aggregate trade of Canada during the maintenance of the National Policy has been as follows:
