



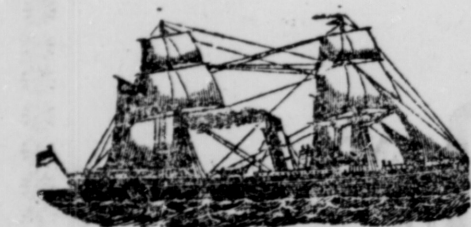

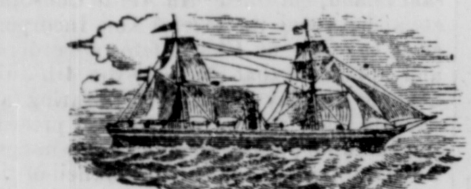

CHINESE REORGANIZATION.

A GREAT deal of importance is naturally attached to any public utterance of Lord Salisbury; and more than ordinary interest has been aroused by the latest statement of the Premier in the House of Lords. In reply to a question of the Marquis of Connaught, a Conservative peer, he is reported to have said that "Her Majesty's Government was communicating with the Chinese Government respecting the reorganization of the army and navy of China, and that negotiations respecting the navy reorganization were more advanced, and there was even hope that a distinguished British officer would make arrangements with the Chinese Government whereby he would renew his help to reorganize the Chinese navy." "China," the Marquis continued, "had shown her willingness to accept British assistance, the difficulty lying in her reluctance to give a sufficient independent position to the officers to enable them to overcome traditional and deep-seated evils." In conclusion, the Premier remarked: "We do not anticipate a catastrophe, yet there can be but one end and issue of the present trend of events so far as the Chinese Empire is concerned, unless its army and navy are developed on lines involving entire reform."

The Premier's announcement has been held to mean that British diplomacy has at last secured the entire confidence of the Chinese Government and that the force of China, organized according to British methods and directed by British officers, will in the future be decidedly opposed to the schemes of aggrandizement indulged in by Russia, Germany and France. Undisciplined and badly led, the army and navy of China have not, heretofore, been of much value from the military point of view. But China can easily put 500,000 men into the field; and these are capable of becoming as brave and powerful in action as the native Egyptians have become under the guidance of British officers and the discipline of British drillmasters.

Nova Scotia, which is not a distinctively agricultural province, is to have another grand exhibition this year—\$16,000 being paid in premiums—in which agriculture will be given a foremost place. The prizes for stock ranging from \$20 to \$1. Perhaps Nova Scotia will give our farmers a chance to compete this year, a last, seeing that our Liberal Government has ordained that we shall not have an exhibition of our own.

The Patriot offers as a late excuse for the attempt of the Liberals to make a grant of \$300,000 to the Greenway Government, in an election year, a charge upon the Education Fund of Manitoba, the statement that "In 1878, the Parliament of Canada passed an Act to advance to Manitoba \$10,000 a year, for three fiscal years, 1878-79, 1879-80 and 1880-81, which moneys were to be repaid to the Government of Canada out of the first proceeds of Manitoba school lands." The Patriot ought to know that \$10,000 a year for three years, cannot be compared with \$300,000 in one year—and that a Provincial election year! The former would be a reasonable draught upon the fund readily recouped by the interest of future years, after the school lands had been sold, and perfectly justifiable if the money were applied to educational purposes.

Montreal Gazette: Some twenty-two protests were entered in connection with the late Ontario elections, but as a result of the saw-off process only seventeen, it is stated, will be tried. This sort of business makes it appear that a good deal of wrong-doing exists on both sides, or else a good deal of bluffing, and either is condemnable.

News Notes.

The business portion of Park City, Utah, was destroyed by fire on Saturday. The property loss is estimated at \$1,600,000. Many people are homeless.

The heat has been so great in Melbourne, Australia, lately that the asphalt tracks and streets have been melted and completely ruined, and cycling has been out of the question.

DAIRY PRODUCE

Prices in Montreal - Imports to Great Britain.

In Montreal there is not much movement of cheese; the prices range from 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 according to quality. The latter is the sellers price and for the most part nominal. Butter is reported quiet at from 16 1/2 to 17 cts per lb.

The total imports of cheese into Great Britain from the colonies and foreign countries for the five months ending May, was 562,396 cwt, against 562,566 in 1897, and 612,484 in 1896. The total imports of butter in the same period were 1,326,737 cwt, against 1,367,011 in 1897, and 1,291,197 in 1896.

There is no change to note in the provision market.
