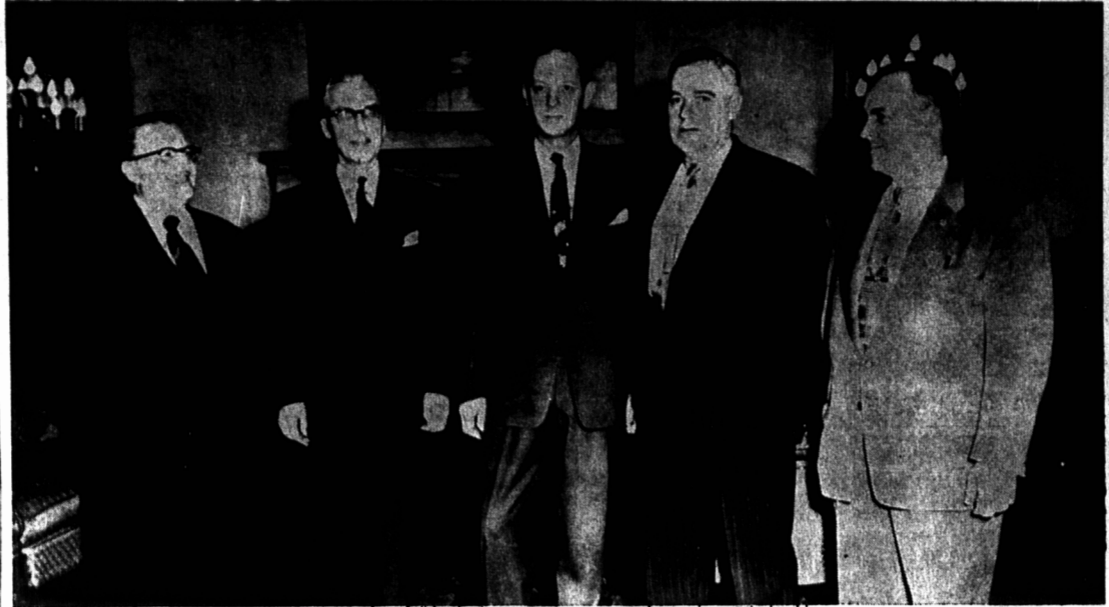

Employment Continuing On Fairly Good Level Locally

The considerable construction activity in Charlottetown is keeping employment at a fairly good level, and a number of jobs underway will continue well into the winter and some of them will last until spring according to the local National Employment office. In the latter category, is the Federal Building which will not be ready for occupancy until next July or August in the opinion of officials Anglo-Norcross.

Other jobs which will give full and winter employment are being carried on by the Imperial Oil Company and the Irving Oil Company near the approaches to the Hillsboro Bridge. In the eastern part of the city also, the Maritime Electric Company is making additions to its plant. Besides these larger jobs, quite a bit of residential building is underway in Charlottetown and district.

Although the construction industry is enjoying a good year, it has been a disappointing season on the water-front. Only a few cargo boats have docked here, and the longshoremen have had a poor year. Summerside on the other hand has had a lively shipping season, and upwards of 200 men have been employed at that port loading steamers for the past few weeks. Two boats are at the present time on the non-exercise in the will of the late Florence Evelyn St. George, London, of a power of appointment in connection with a \$7,000,000 trust under P. E. I.

VETERAN SAILOR DEAD

LONDON (Reuters) — Capt. Charles Irving, 85, whose sailing memories stretched back to classic tussles 70 years ago between the last of the great tea clippers, the Cutty Sark and the Thermopylae, died here Friday. It was disclosed Monday, Irving was on the Cutty Sark when she beat her great rival by seven days in the later commanded steamships of the Peninsular and Oriental Line.

DESTROY ANY AIRCRAFT

WASHINGTON (AP)—Army Secretary Wilber Brucker said Monday night the Nike guided missile "can seek out and destroy any aircraft, no matter how high or fast it may fly." This missile now is the "major army weapon" for the anti-aircraft defence of the principal cities and industrial areas of the United States the secretary told the Society of Medical Consultants to the armed forces.

Appeal in Potato Case Dismissed In Supreme Court

The Supreme Court of Appeal has dismissed the appeal of the Potato Distributors Incorporated against a previous judgment of Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell by holding that a contract between the Potato Distributors Incorporated and the Island Co-op Services was not nullified by the bankruptcy of the latter firm.

Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy ruled—his judgment was concurred in by Mr. Justice M. R. MacGuigan—that by virtue of the provisions of the Bankruptcy Act, the trustee, the Eastern Trust Company, was entitled to carry on business of a bankrupt for the purpose of beneficially administering his estate. The Court stated that

in fulfilling the contract, the trustee was merely clearing up a part of the business which had begun before the Island Co-op Services went into bankruptcy and that in so doing the trustee would be benefiting the estate.

Potato Distributors Inc. of Florida had contracted to purchase 27,500 bags of potatoes in each of the years 1955, 1956, and 1957 at the price of \$1.75 per 100-pound bag delivered at the wharf here.

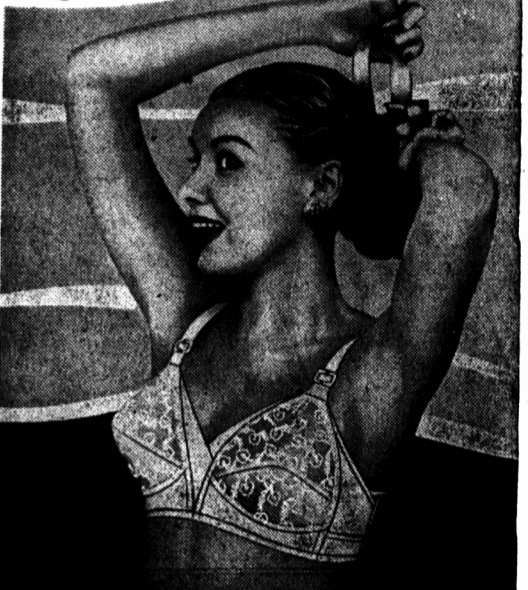
The Florida firm sought to have the contract declared null and void on the ground that the Island Co-op Services had become bankrupt and could therefore no longer fulfill the terms of the contract. If successful in their contention, the Florida firm would then have been able to secure those potatoes on the open market this year for \$1.00 a bag less than

the contract price. The trustee maintained that under the Bankruptcy Act it had the same contractual rights as had the bankrupt.

Argument Continued In \$7,000,000 Trust Case

The full bench of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island heard argument continued yesterday on the non-exercise in the will of the late Florence Evelyn St. George, London, of a power of appointment in connection with a \$7,000,000 trust under P. E. I. The Court heard Messrs. J. O. Campbell, Q.C., M. Alban Farmer, Q.C., K. M. Martin, Q.C. and R. R. Bell, Q.C. Mr. Martin will continue this morning and will be followed by Mr. W. E. Bentley, Q.C. and Mr. J. P. Nicholson. The action for a declaratory judgment was originally commenced in 1948 and in its present stage has been referred to the full court on questions of law. The trust was set up in Charlottetown in 1934 from the estate of Mrs. St. George's father, George F. Baker of New York, with the Montreal Trust Co. the present plaintiff, as trustee. Mrs. St. George died in 1938.

The plaintiff company's manager is Mr. Goad and its counsel are Mr. H. F. MacPhee, Q.C. and Mr. Eldridge Cate, Q.C. of Montreal.

Defendants are: Royal Exchange Assurance Co., London, England, represented by Mr. R. R. Bell, Q.C. and Mr. G. R. Foster; Lady Gunston, Evelyn St. George Col. Ferris St. George, Mrs. Winch and Richard Wellesley Gunston, represented by Senator John T. Hackett, Q.C. of Montreal, Mr. M. A. Farmer, Q.C. and Mr. David L. Drummond, a London solicitor; George St. George, represented by Mr. K. M. Martin, Q.C. and Mr. William Harnish of the New York bar; Several children of the parties, represented by Mr. W. E. Bentley, Q.C.; Unborn infants, represented by Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, Q.C. And other interests, represented by Mr. J. P. Nicholson.

Drew Stresses Tax Problem

TROIS-RIVIERES, Que. CP—George Drew, national leader of the Progressive Conservative party, Saturday night called for immediate effort to solve the tax problem arising from the growing needs of provincial and municipal government.

He told the 100th anniversary dinner of the party that municipalities across the country are in need of assistance.

The costs of schools, hospitals and highways are rising every year, he told the 1,600 guests.

"No temporary solution will do, other than a clear definition of taxing powers," Mr. Drew said the tax problem "has been discussed for the last 15 years and the time is long overdue for a re-statement in modern terms of the principles which united Canada in 1867."
