ATTEMPT HIGH PEAK

MOSCOW (Reuters)—A Soviet-Chinese expedition has begun its final assault on 24,338-foot Muztagh-Ata peak in the Kashgar Mountains, the Soviet news agency Tass reported Friday. The peak is on the Russian-Chinese border.

Glen Roy Farmer Loses Barn By Fire Yesterday

For the second time in two years fire took a heavy toll on the farm of Alex MacKenzie, Glen Roy, when the new barn constructed about one year ago was again totally destroyed by flames.

At the time of the outbreak only one of Mr. MacKenzie's boys was working in a back field, whilst the remainder of the family were visiting the city. Hearing the dog barking the lad came to investigate and discovered smoke coming from the barn at approximately one thirty yesterday afternoon.

A call was immediately put through for the assistance of the Mount Stewart Fire Department, when they arrived on the scene the blaze was too far advanced to save any portion of the building.

A further call was sent to the Parkdale Fire Department for additional aid in saving the remainder of the buildings which were in imminent danger due to the strong wind blowing in their direction. Despite their combined efforts the roof of a machinery shed was badly burned.

Mr. MacKenzie reported that all livestock and machinery were saved and the barn contained a little more than ten loads of hay all of which had been put there Wednesday. He was not able to estimate the value of his loss and said that it was only partially covered by insurance.

Badly Burned By Phosphorus

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP)—Five days ago 22-year-old Guy Scott kicked a "harmless looking green object" near Fort Jackson army camp. It exploded and burned him.

Now, as Scott lies in hospital, the injured parts of his body occasionally give off sparks. Towels and blankets that were used to wrap him flared up when they became dry.

Scott's physician said it appeared that the patient has severe phosphorus burns. He gave Scott a 50-50 chance to survive.

Scott was on a fishing trip near the army post when he came across the object. He said he accidentally kicked it.

It apparently was a phosphorus training bomb.
