Replying to Mr. Dunphy's invitation, Mrs. Macdonald said she "would not have time to participate in joint meetings." Mr. Kingston said that he would participate if the Conservative candidate requested joint meetings.

Mr. Dunphy said he was far from satisfied with the reasons for the other candidates' refusal to participate. "Joint meetings of this nature," he said, "could be a great source of information to the voters of the county."

"If the Liberal and Conservative candidates are in any way interested in the people they think they will make a suitable decision. We don't want the city satisfied at our expense."

## ELITE POTATO Get Charter

The board's statement said: "The potato business is well developing in the province where we are entering into competition with markets in all provinces of Canada, fifteen or more of the following countries of the world, Venezuela, Greece, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, South Africa, Italy, Uruguay, Holland, Puerto Rico, Argentina, The Bahamas and Chile."

"It should not be necessary to put the brunt of the argument to gain in this competition for markets for our product there can be only one direction to pursue, and that is of continually improving the product which will be distributed through the province for the benefit of our growers."

PLANTING IN PROGRESS

The farm has been purchased and planting of the acreage is in progress. This will produce the nucleus of disease free, high yielding, uniform stock which we know in a few years can be propagated to a point where the whole province can also be planted with this best seed in the world.

"We are pleased with the encouragement and assistance received from the Provincial Department of Agriculture. The encouragement received from the local representatives of the Federal Department of Agriculture, particularly Glen Ramsey, district inspector seed potato certification has been most gratifying. Mr. Ramsey considered this move in the right direction and approached his department in Canada, to this province and assisted the committee in the selection of the farm which he described as a most suitable location because of its isolation and the way in which it lends itself to "isolation within isolation". Mr. Scannell was entrusted and commended to the Board for their initiative and far sightedness in protecting the seed industry and for calling on us to assist in the arrangement for the setting-up of the elite seed farm.

Scannell has pointed out that it will be the first Federally approved and supervised farm of this type in Canada."
