

**Local and Other Items.**

THE CITY COUNCIL meets this evening.

THE golden wedding of the Emperor of Germany will be celebrated on Thursday next.

NORMAL SCHOOL.—The closing oral examination of the Normal School will begin tomorrow at ten o'clock.

RIPE STRAWBERRIES.—The Halifax Herald is responsible for the statement that ripe strawberries were picked at Oakville on Friday last. The paragrapher naively adds that "this is the first of the season." The Herald reporters should remember that it is only a month or two since last year's strawberries "ceased to be."

THE funeral of the late Baron de Rothschild took place on the 6th. The remains were interred at Willesdene, near London. There were forty-two mourning coaches in the procession, and upwards of four hundred private carriages followed the body to the grave. The Prince of Wales and Earl Beaconsfield sent carriages.

RAILWAY.—We understand that instructions have been received from Ottawa by the Railway authorities to pay one month's salary as a retiring allowance to the following employees who were dismissed at the re-adjustment of the staff:—Messrs. Faulkner, Brown, May, Poole, Wickwire, McLeod and John A. McEachern.

A SAD SIGHT IN A POLICE OFFICE.—At the Police Court on Friday morning, says the HX. Herald, a grey headed old man with one foot almost in the grave, was charged with being drunk and disorderly and assaulting people on the streets; and his son, 12 years of age, disorderly and throwing stones on the street. The father was fined \$5 or 60 days, and the son \$2 or 20 days.

THE Halifax Herald says: The city is being flooded with counterfeit fifty, twenty-five and ten cent pieces. The fifty and twenty-five cent pieces are all dated "1871," are lighter in weight and of duller metal than the genuine article. The coral on the Queen's head is also slightly blurred. A large number of these counterfeits were passed on Saturday. Be on the look out.

THE mine of Anthracite coal at Point Lepreaux, N. S., is attracting the attention of American capitalists. Mr. H. L. Fuller, lately manager of the Jeddo colliery, Pennsylvania, has been instructed by Mr. Belloni, of New York, proprietor of the Black House Mines, Cape Breton, to proceed at once to Lepreaux and make a careful examination of the nature and extent of the coal deposit there.—Monetary Times.

THE success of the Newfoundland seal fishery, for which fears were entertained, is pronounced by letters of 6th and 10th of May to be assured. It appears that up to the 6th inst. 38 steamers and sailing vessels had arrived at St. John's, Nfld., with 257,055 seals, in all weighing 114,200 cwt. Among the largest cargoes were the S. S. "Greenland," with 24,022; the "Eagle" and "Falcon," with 20,391 and 22,030 respectively. The average load of each vessel would be about 3,005 seals.

As James Sutherland, shoemaker, of Loganville, was going home in a carriage from Pictou, he overtook one John Macdonald, (commonly known as big Hugh's son) and invited him to ride. Mr. Macdonald evidently having some illfeeling, it is supposed on account of not being chosen heir of some property which Sutherland got for maintaining three aged women, replied: "I can walk and thrash you too." Then attempted to kick Sutherland out of the wagon, but failing, jumped up behind the seat; struck him several times in the region of the stomach and chest, and left him as dead. Dr. Norrie was summoned, and pronounced him to be seriously injured in the lungs, from which he bled profusely. At latest accounts he was still living and some hopes of his partial recovery are entertained. Macdonald weighs about 200 lbs., while his victim is slightly built, about 120 lbs. weight, and lame from an axe cut in the knee.

We have received information that the Fairbairn family, celebrated Scottish vocalists, will visit this city in a short time. They are now performing in Halifax. Of one of their entertainments the Halifax Herald says:

The Fairbairn Family of Scottish Vocalists made their first appearance in this city last night, and found a good audience awaiting them in the Academy of Music. The father and his two daughters form a talented trio, thoroughly versed in the art of entertaining. Mr. Fairbairn, or "Angus," as the programme calls him, is the principal figure and interweaver of the different songs with a thread of racy narrative and explanation which enhances their effect materially. He has a fine voice himself and gives his songs with excellent spirit and expression. His clever daughters Miss Bessie and Miss Polly sang very sweetly and brightly the serious and the comic songs assigned to them, and speedily won the hearts of their hearers. Altogether it was a really delightful evening, not only to sons of the heather, but to all who enjoy good music well rendered, and every member on the programme was greeted with applause as generous as it was well-merited.
