Personal.

Col. John McKinlay, a wealthy and well-known resident of Pictou, is dead. Mr. Fuller, chief architect of the public works department, is post-ratified with typhoid fever. His condition is serious. There is, says the Moncton Times a streak of anomalous humor in the average Grit editor. General Laurier's majority in the banner Grit county in Nova Scotia, has just been increased from 8 to 45, and the Halifax Chronicle gravely remarks that his seat has been made so insecure that he "can scarcely hope to pull through in another contest." The same paper states that the Grit candidate was defeated in this Grit stronghold through the influence of Grit voters.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Shou'd be Investigated.

St. John, Oct. 29.

An inquest was held at Musquash to-day on the body of Thompson D. McPharg, lumberman, aged 45, who died on Sunday. He had been drinking freely on Friday at several houses there. He had some fuss with one of his companions, and is alleged to have been struck by a man named Andrews, though several witnesses at the coroner's inquest testified that Andrews' hand was open when he hit McPharg. The deceased told Dr. McFarlane that a handspike had fallen on him, and the doctor testified that only some violent injury would account for the condition in which he found the patient when called in. The jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes, but the people of Musquash are dissatisfied therewith, and want the case thoroughly investigated.

French Politics.

Paris, Oct. 23.

General Boulanger was present in the Chamber of Deputies to-day. Baron Soubeyran stated that the enormous proportions of the public debt demanded a reduction in the government staff, and the sale of state railways. M. Roche, reporter of the budget committee, declared the criticisms were exaggerated. It was not the French expenditures alone that were increasing. All European budgets were augmenting. Europe has been transferred into an immense entrenched camp. France was not free in her movements; she was bound by fatality of events, and it was impossible to isolate herself. He appealed to the patriotism of the members of the Chamber to pass the budget.

Still Another Defaulter.

Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 23.

The greatest excitement prevails here in financial and business as well as social circles over the reported defalcation of City Treasurer Thomas Axworthy. Axworthy left the city on Sept. 28, going direct to New York city, from whence he is said to have left for Montreal on Sept. 29. Investigation so far develops a shortage in the city funds of over \$385,000, and it is thought that further investigation will increase the amount. Axworthy has fled to Europe.

The Manitoba Trouble.

Ottawa, Oct. 23.

Manitoba matters are quiet. The fight is really between the Canadian Pacific and the Northern Pacific. The latter are using Greenway and Martin as cat's paws, but the hot water from the Canadian Pacific engine seems to have dampened their courage. No attempt was made yesterday to force a crossing for the Red River road, and all remains quiet awaiting the decision of the court regarding the injunction.

The Southern Plague.

Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 23.

The epidemic is slowly ebbing out. Many new cases are reported daily, but the type is much milder. Deaths are rare. All volunteer corps of visiting physicians will depart for their homes on Thursday. Resident doctors can now handle the epidemic easily. New cases, 33; one death.

Rioting in Ireland.

Dublin, Oct. 23.

A riot broke out at Moy to-day between Orangemen and Nationalists. The police reinforced charged the mob with bayonets. Several policemen were injured with stones thrown by rioters.

Mrs. Doyle Acquitted.

Halifax, Oct. 23.

After a trial extending over six days, a Halifax jury to-night acquitted Mrs. Jane Doyle of being accessory with Preoper to the murder of her husband.

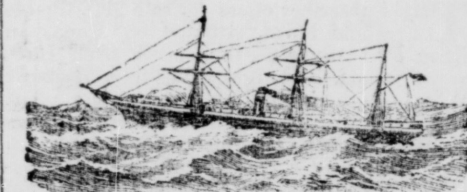
