CANADIAN PACIFIC EARNINGS.—Canadian Pacific Railway returns of traffic earnings from February 21 to 28, 1886, show that \$132,000 were earned, and in 1885 \$117,000; increase for 1886 \$15,000; miles in operation, 3,827.

The two large steamers, the Carroll and Worcester, have not been employed during the winter, a single smaller boat taking their place. They are laid up in the dock at Boston.—Boston Record.

ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER ABROAD.—Among the students taking the lead in the Medical Department of the University of the city of New York, we are happy to see that Dr. Ronald J. McCormack, a former Charlottetown boy, has graduated with honors, receiving the degree of Doctor of Medicine. This is one of the largest and best medical schools in the United States, and we congratulate Dr. McCormack on his success. He has well sustained the reputation of our successful men abroad. The Dr. is a son of Mr. Peter McCormack, formerly of Nauyas, Lot 43, and brother of Dr. Alexander L. McCormack, of East Boston, Mass.

THE following letter concerning the man Gillis, whose sentence has been commuted to imprisonment for life, was yesterday afternoon received by Marshal Flynn:—

MASSACHUSETTS REFORMATORY, Concord, Mass., March 2, 1886. To Chief of Police, Charlottetown, P. E. I. DEAR SIR,—I learn with the deepest regret and sorrow that Alexander Gillis is sentenced to be hanged on the 11th inst. Will you please furnish me with the facts of his case, and of his trial, for we who have known him for a number of years can hardly credit him with such a crime as murder, and never in a single instance proved himself unworthy of that trust. He worked for me daily for two and a half years, and I have seen him under circumstances which try men, but he always controlled himself. Will you tell him that he has my earnest prayers in his behalf, and if he is allowed to write to anyone, that I would like a word from him. Most respectfully yours, W. S. JELAND, Concord, Mass.

THE prisoner Gillis received the news of the commutation calmly. He had given up all hope of a reprieve, and made every preparation to meet his God. The gallows had been placed in position in the northwest corner of the jail yard, the hangman secured, tickets of admission to see the execution issued, and every preparation for the fatal day made. The past few days must have been exceedingly trying ones to the unfortunate man. Seated in his lonely cell, listening to the hammering of nails, and other noises incidental to the erection of the gallows, his feelings can be better imagined than described. Every stroke of the hammer must have forcibly reminded him of the uncertainties of life and the near approach of that day upon which it had been decreed he should end his career on earth, and go to that bourne from whence no traveller returns.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

BILLS INTRODUCED.

OTTAWA, March 8.

Charlton introduced a bill the punishment of seduction. Edgar introduced a bill to amend the Supreme Court of Canada Act, by providing that a Provincial Government in doubt about the constitutionality of Provincial Acts may, by intervention of the Governor-General in Council, bring the question before the Court for adjudication.

In answer to Blake Thompson said, except in few cases prisoners connected with the rebellion were not regularly committed for trial, but were taken in overt acts of rebellion and held for trial or discharged. There were in all 46 half-breeds prisoners, 81 Indians and 2 whites. Eighteen half-breeds were tried for treason felony, one for high treason and one for murder. These were all convicted. Eleven in all were discharged on their own recognizances of \$400 each, to appear to receive sentence when called upon. Eight were discharged upon their own recognizances to appear. One was discharged by order of General Middleton. Four were discharged a Battledore. Of the Indians, 21 were tried for murder. Ten charged with treason felony were discharged on promising to come up for trial of the white men. Jackson, charged with treason felony, was acquitted. Thomas Scott was discharged on ground of insanity.

In answer to a question, Sir John said negotiations were entered into with Mr. O'Donohoe about his entering the cabinet in 1882. Mr. O'Donohoe found he could not bring strength to the Government, and waived for consideration in favor of Senator Smith, who is now in the cabinet. In answer, Carling said the total number of immigrants reported to have settled in Canada in 1885 was 79,159.

A Disturbed Loyalist Meeting.

TORONTO, Ont., March 8.

A public meeting was held here to-night to express sympathy with the Loyalists in Ireland. The hall was packed and hundreds could not obtain admittance. Every member of the Irish National League was present and the Orangemen, hearing they had made arrangements to pack the house, turned out in full force. During the evening, the speakers were constantly interrupted with howls and hisses and angry feelings were thereby engendered. When the first resolution was being put to the meeting a prominent Land Leaguer rose in the body of the hall and said he had an amendment to offer. The wildest uproar followed. He made his way to the platform, where he was surrounded by several excited Orangemen, who, with uplifted sticks only waited an opportunity to strike him. In the body of the hall the scene was terrible. Had a blow been struck, blood would have flowed freely, but fortunately quiet was soon restored.

Arrested for Murder.

ANNAPOLIS, N. S., March 8.

Ebenzer Jones, (colored) aged 60, and his son, aged 14, who were committed at Bridgetown Saturday to stand trial at the Supreme Court in June, charged with murdering a boy named Wallace Carter last October, were brought to town Saturday and lodged in jail. They assert their innocence, and hope soon to be released.

Terrific Explosion.

LONDON, March 8.

The boiler of the tug Ridsman exploded in Cardiff harbor this morning. Vessel and crew, consisting of six persons, were blown to atoms. The cylinder of the engine struck a passing Italian ship, a quarter of a mile distant, and killed the pilot.

Moncton Civic Election.

MONCTON, March 8.

The civic elections took place to-day. The greatest interest, of course, centered in the Mayoralty, Dennis A. Duffy being elected by a majority over McKenzie of 11 votes.

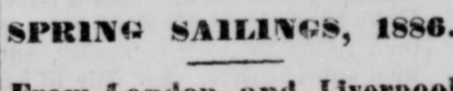
