## MANY ENTRIES AT MONTREAL.

Made by Shippers at Custom House.

RUSHING SHIPMENTS IN FROM EUROPE.

To Get the Benefit of the Tariff Before August 1st.

MONTREAL, July 22.—The custom house at this port is having an exceptionally busy time just now, shipments being rushed in from Europe to get the benefit of the present tariff before August 1st.

Consequently this will likely be record month.

Up to the 20th inst., the receipts for the month were \$755,000; \$225,000 more than for the whole of July last year.

One ship paid \$33,000 duty on a cargo of rice last week from Rangoon.

PORTO RICO.

The Strength of its Fortifications.

The fortifications of San Juan are thus described by the New York Herald:

It is a difficult harbor to enter on account of the narrowness of the channel, and for the same reason is capable of being easily defended by mines. It is defended by fortifications, the principal one of which is Morro Castle. On the right bank is the castle of San Juan de la Cruz. On the Cenedo shoal, northeast of the city, is the castle of San Cristobal, which defends the city on the landside. Upon the barracks of this castle is Caballero fort, with twenty-two guns.

Below the castle is a drill ground, with batteries directed towards the sea, the land and the drawbridge of the castle. Then follow three large ravelines—San Carlos, occupying the top of the hill; Principe, on the slope of Cuesta, and Principal. All these fortifications are in great part cut out of solid rock. San Cristobal Castle is connected with Morro Castle on the north by a wall of modern construction.

Starting from the southern part of San Cristobal Castle and following the edge of the bay is a line of bulwark leading to the fortress of Santa Catalina, the residence of the governor general. Between Morro Castle and the north coast there is in the middle of the entrance to the bays a small fort called Canello, which by its position obliges vessels attempting to force an entrance to pass between its fire and that of Morro Castle.

San Juan's capture as a landing base would involve a long and hazardous bombardment by the American fleet. It is probable that a landing will be made at some other point and that San Juan will be taken by combined land and sea operations—possibly by a prolonged siege. There are numerous small bays and inlets on the north coast where landings could be made. Probably the best of these is at Arrecibo, to the west of San Juan, but connected with that city by a railway running near the coast.

Porto Rico is defended by a considerable force including 7,200 regulars and 12,000 volunteers. The headquarters of the army is at San Juan, but the troops are divided among eight other stations. As the Island is small in comparison with Cuba, they could be rapidly concentrated at San Juan, which is to be immediately attacked.

## GENERAL MILES STARTED YESTERDAY

On His Expedition to Porto Rico

ESCORTED BY A NUMBER OF WARSHIPS.

Over Ten Thousand Troops Will Follow Him.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—General Miles got away yesterday afternoon for Porto Rico, convoyed by the Massachusetts, Cincinnati, Annapolis, Gloucester, Wasp and Leyden.

Secretary Alger believes that General Miles, on the Yale, will arrive at his destination on Saturday morning with 3,900 men under his immediate command. One day later will come 4,000 men on transports and the day following that 3,500 more.

Whether landing will be deferred until the arrival of this entire force or whether General Miles will take the initiative himself and hoist the flag on Porto Rican soil is left to the discretion of that officer.

CANADIAN GOLD.

\$22,000,000 Out of the Klondike Country.

VANCOUVER, July 20.—W. L. Foster the latest arrival from Skagway from White Horse Rapids says: I had a long conversation with Major Steele, last man out from Dawson, and he informed me and many others that the output of gold this season would be at least \$22,000,000. The Major also stated that one of the boats running from Dawson to St. Michaels would alone carry \$12,000,000 in gold. I consider the estimate made by Major Steele a decidedly conservative one. He also stated that the Klondike was overcrowded with men who were not accustomed to hardships, or in fact hard work of any kind, and that many of them had practically decided to return to the United States. The output of gold, I was told, will be larger than was ever expected by the most sanguine, and I expect another big rush to Alaska this fall. Major Steele also said that food in Dawson was plentiful and cheap, it now being possible to buy flour for \$5 per sack, which is considered a very low figure.

PRINCE OF WALES' ACCIDENT.

Another Surgeon Called in, and Rontgen Rays Being Used.

LONDON, July 20.—A bulletin issued last evening at Marlborough house says: "The Prince of Wales has passed a fairly comfortable day, considering the severe accident from which he is suffering." The affair causes some anxiety. Another surgeon has been called in, and Rontgen rays are being employed. It is feared that the accident will compel the Prince to remain indoors for a month.

The Prince of Wales is quite cheerful, although he has had to endure considerable pain. It is understood that the examination and consultation of surgeons will be resumed tomorrow. Fears are expressed that the injury to the patella (knee-cap) may result in a permanent weakness, perhaps in lameness. All his engagements for the next four weeks have been cancelled.
