MURDER OR SUICIDE?

Terrible Deed at Berwick, Nova Scotia.

Farmer Shot Through the Head.

HALIFAX, Oct. 25.—Thomas Buckley, aged 58 years, was found shot through the head in his house, a short distance from Berwick, King's County, yesterday morning. He had been seen, on Saturday, working around his place. He had been ploughing all that day, assisted by a hired man, whom he paid at night.

The revolver found on the floor points to murder. An investigation is now being held.

FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

Twenty-eight Persons Drowned in the Hudson River.

Engineer and Fireman Dead at Their Posts.

GARRISON, N. Y., Oct. 25.—A passenger train on the Grand Central Railway plunged into the Hudson River on Sunday morning and twenty-eight souls were launched into eternity. The train was running at the rate of about 25 miles an hour. Daylight had not yet appeared. All the passengers in the sleepers were in bed, and three of these cars sunk in deep water. Neither the engineer nor the fireman will ever tell the story of the terrible moment; for, with his hand upon the throttle, the engineer plunged with his engine to the river bottom, and the fireman, too, was at his post. Behind them came the express car and sleepers, and these piled on top of the engine.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Because of the new tariff laws of the United States and Canada, W. H. Lever, the big English soap manufacturer, has come to the United States to establish a factory, and he will go to Canada for the same project for that country. Mr. Lever, with his three daughters, arrived here today on the White Star line steamship Majestic. He has a monster \$10,000,000 soap factory at Port Sunlight, England, where he employs 3,000 persons. From this place he has heretofore supplied the trade of foreign countries. The prohibitive tariffs against foreign soaps, he says, force him to erect factories in those countries. He has already started new works on eleven acres of land in Switzerland. When he finds a suitable location in this country he will also build a factory, and then will go to Toronto to establish a branch soap works there. He expects to go as far west as Chicago.
