some of the things that went on at the conference and spoke particularly of the great interest shown in the access of women to education. He said this was so much a part of our way of life that few people gave it any thought but in the 'backward' countries it was now an important sub-

ject. To illustrate his point Dr. Shaw asked how many of the female teachers present were planning on going into the nursing profession. Several hands were raised, but when he asked the same question regarding medicine and law none responded. The speaker said it was typical as people generally regarded these as male professions and as a result tended to stay out of them.

Despite the difficulty, common apparently to all 51 countries represented at the conference, of obtaining good teachers and retaining them in the profession, he noted that not once was it suggested that there should be any lowering of standards either academically or professionally.

**Science Studies**

Dr. Shaw devoted a large part of his talk to the value of science in the secondary schools. He insisted that the science taught should be on an everyday living basis rather than be designed to create scientists for war purposes. He believed it should be arranged in such a manner as to better enable the young people studying it to appreciate their environment.

He thought the teaching of natural science at the secondary school level should be as extensive as possible and should provide a common core of knowledge for all pupils between the ages of 11 and 15 and a wider and deeper study for certain groups of older pupils. He said the teaching of natural science in secondary schools should provide pupils with basic knowledge about the world and men, give them experience in scientific methods, and develop their general culture and sensitiveness.

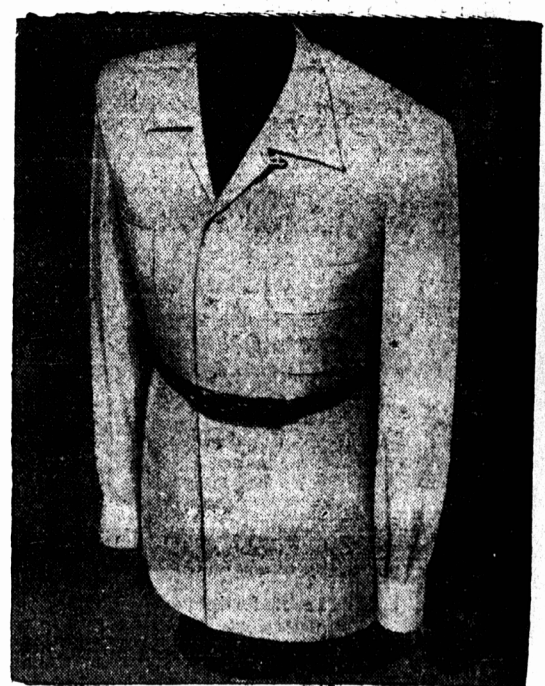
