



# Amherst-S' side Holmans Play To 13-All Draw

The Amherst Bluejays and Summerside Holmans Intermediates played ten innings to a 13-all draw at Queen Elizabeth baseball park yesterday afternoon, and the game was called because of darkness.

Freddie Pittman's single in the last of the ninth inning sent Garnett Jones and Coke Grady scampering across the plate with the two tallies needed to tie up the ball game. The series will be continued at Amherst on Saturday, when two games will be played and if a third game is necessary, it will be played in Summerside next Wednesday.

The game was a free-hitting contest, the visitors polling out 16 base hits, including Len Smith's home run, and Holmans had 15 bingles with a home run by Paul Schurman with Lefurgy riding the sacks.

Schurman started on the mound for Holmans and for three innings allowed only one base knock, but the Bluejays caught up with him in the fourth. They collected seven hits and a like number of runs off his delivery. Lefurgy relieved him and three more runs were scored before the side was retired, two of them charged to Schurman.

With the score 11-2 against him, Lefurgy kept the Amherst boys in check for three innings, while the Holman bludgens kept pecking away at southpaw Murphy, and the home forces scored one run in the fourth, three in the fifth, one in the sixth, and four in the seventh, tying the score at 11-all. Amherst scored two in the eighth, making it 13-11, and held Summerside scoreless in the bottom half of that frame, but Holmans came through with the necessary runs in their half of the ninth to knot the contest. Neither side scored in the tenth.

Paul Schurman hit a single, double, triple and home run in six trips to the plate, sharing batting honors with Gunnar Cox who hit four for six. Collie Ross got three bingles in six trips for Amherst.

Fielding was spotty, the visitors committing eight miscues, and Holmans' five. Bob Milson, Amherst third baseman, made a beautiful one-hand stab of Grant Grady's foul in the eighth. Paul Schurman contributed a spectacular defensive play in the eighth inning when he ran far back in centerfield to glove Gray's long fly in the ninth, and he made another fairly good catch in the same inning. Grant Grady's grab of MacLeod's deep fly at the Granville Street curb in the third was another good effort, and Cox's

knock down of LeA Smith's sizzler to first in the second frame was good.

Gillis took up the pitching burden from Murphy in the seventh, and Len Smith pitched the tenth inning for Amherst.

# Giants Win Series Opener 5-2

## Pinch-Hitter Rhodes Slams Homer In 10th

NEW YORK (AP)—Pinch-hitter Jim (Dusty) Rhodes slammed a home run off the top of the right-field wall in the 10th inning and scored behind Willie Mays and Hank Thompson to give New York Giants a 5-2 victory over Cleveland Indians in the first game of the world series today.

Rhodes' wallop, which spoiled a fine pitching performance by Cleveland's Bob Lemon, came with one out. Mays walked and stole second and then Thompson was given an intentional pass to set the stage for the winning blow.

Giants tied the score in the third inning after Cleveland had scored twice in the first. From there on it was a scoreless struggle until the 10th.

Lemon went all the way for Cleveland while Sal Maglie, Giants' starter, was relieved in the eighth. Marv Grissom, who snuffed out Cleveland's eighth-inning threat, was the winning pitcher.

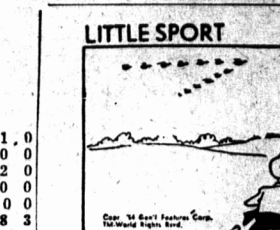
A capacity crowd of 52,751 paid \$34 million to see the game in the first extra-inning game in world series play since Oct. 5, 1952, and it was a real thriller.

Mays made one great catch in the eighth to cut off two possible Cleveland runs while the score was tied. His victim, on that occasion, Vic Wertz, almost broke it up in the first of the 10th when he clouted a long double for his fourth hit of the game.

The second game of the series will be played here tomorrow with Johnny Antonelli 21-7 scheduled to pitch for Giants against Cleveland's Early Wynn 23-11.

Indians got off to their two-run lead in the first when Maglie started in a shaky manner. Sal served up three straight balls to leadoff man Al Smith, then hit him in the back with the fourth pitch. Bobby Avila followed with a single and Smith reached third when Don Mueller bobbled the ball.

It's just as Giants' manager, Leo Durocher, said, "Odds don't mean a thing", he snapped just before sending his club against the Tribe in the Polo Grounds yesterday.

Rhodes, who was used by the Giants as a pinch-hitter for most of the season, had his play set up for him by Mays. Willie walked and stole second with one out in the 10th. Hank Thompson was given an intentional pass to first with the Indians eyeing Monty Irvin who was on deck as a prospect to hit into a double play or a strike-out. However, Durocher replaced Irvin with Rhodes and by doing so allowed Merv Grissom to get credited with the first 1954 World Series win.

It was a hard game for right-hander Bob Lemon to lose as he went all the way for the Tribe. The Giants got to Lemon for a total of 9 hits, three of which came in the 3rd inning as the Giants scored two runs. Maglie, who started shakily, gave up 7 hits before he was pulled with nobody out in the 8th. He was followed by southpaw Don Liddle and right-hander Merv Grissom, both of whom had exceptionally close calls while on the mound.

It was anyone's game from the 3rd inning on, with only sheer luck saving several Indian runs from being scored. As Tribe manager Al Lopez said after the game, "The longest ball out and the shortest home run of the season beat us, that's all!" He was referring to Vic Wertz's 450 ft. drive which Willie Mays pulled down in the 8th in sensational manner, and Dusty's final round-tripper.

Today two, six-foot mound mangers go to work in the second game in the Polo Grounds, before swinging to Municipal Stadium in Cleveland for numbers 3, 4 and 5 if necessary. They are southpaw Johnny Antonelli (21-7) of the Giants against Cleveland's right-hander, Early Wynn (23-11). Antonelli is a strapping 180 pounds of hard muscle and bone who can throw a lightning fast ball accurately over the plate. "I have enough stuff to win with my fast ball, curve and change-up," he says. "I've learned to pace myself for nine innings. I won't need any fancy pitches until I begin to lose my speed." The authenticity of these statements will be disclosed today as Johnny faces some of the A's top batters.

## Rhodes Confesses Hit Was Accident

NEW YORK (AP)—Dusty Rhodes, mighty New York Giants pinch-hitter whose home run in the 10th won the opening game of the world series, confessed after the game Wednesday it was an accident of sorts.

"I wasn't trying for a home run," he said. "I was just trying for a hit."

But what a hit—a decisive three-run homer!

"It was the best hit I ever got in my life," he said, laughing. "Were you worried going up there as a pinch hitter?" he was asked.

"Nope," he said flatly. "The pitcher is the guy who worries. He's got to get me out."

Manager Leo Durocher, after praising Rhodes and Willie Mays, heaped his affection on his pitchers.

"It was great relief pitching," he said. "I got just what I wanted."

His relievers were Don Liddle and Marv Grissom.

"That catch of Mays—it was great. The wind was blowing, he had his back to the diamond."

But he refused to call it the greatest catch ever made in a series game. "There have been some terrific ones before."

"I've seen Willie catch so many nothing he does now ever fazes me."

Captain Al Dark accepted congratulations for his team and diverted all the praise elsewhere.

"Mays' catch—just one word for it—wonderful," he said.

Antonelli Vs. Early Wynn In Second Game  
NEW YORK (CP)—It will be lefty Johnny Antonelli of the Giants against right-hander Early Wynn of the Indians today in the second game of the 51st world series.

Antonelli compiled a 21-7 record over the season. Wynn's mark was 23-11. Antonelli's winning percentage, an even .750, was the best in the National League.
