

Speculation Will Britannia Fly U.S. Presidential Flag

TORONTO (CP)—Will the royal yacht Britannia fly the U.S. presidential flag when President Eisenhower goes aboard to help open the St. Lawrence Seaway? Or the Stars and Stripes? If so, where? The questions are posed by Ernest H. Bartlett, Toronto Telegram features editor, who in two wars served in the Royal Navy and Royal Canadian Navy.

The admiralty has ordered these flags for Britannia: (1) On the jackstaff at the bow, the Union Jack; on the foremast, the admiralty flag—red with a fouled anchor; on the mainmast when the Queen is aboard, the Royal Standard; on the mizzenmast, the Union Flag—known as the Union Jack when flown from a jackstaff, on the stern staff, the White Ensign of the Royal Navy.

Bartlett suggests the admiralty flag at the foremast should be replaced in Canadian waters by the flag of the Canadian naval board which is the admiralty's Canadian counterpart.

He says he does not think the Queen, though not a member of the board, would object to sailing under the board's flag.

"Nor do I think that the lords of the admiralty should raise any objection. Granted that Britannia is a unit of the Royal Navy...

IF REPORT FAVORABLE

Island Senator Promises Fight For The Causeway

OTTAWA (Special)—If the report of the engineering survey, expected at the end of this month, is favorable, Prince Edward Island senators and MPs will "keep up the pressure" to build a causeway to the mainland, Senator J.J. MacDonald said today.

Speaking in the Upper Chamber during the Throne Speech debate, Senator MacDonald said the capital costs, operating cost and deficits of the present ferry service between Tormentine and Borden, since 1917, had cost a grand total of \$47,854,495.

"What I would like to know is how long the people of Canada are going to stand for such an expensive operation as this?" he asked.

Compared with this construction of a causeway would cost about \$60 million, Mr. MacDonald said, and "if the government were to give the go-ahead signal now it might be completed within 10 years."

"We from the province of Prince Edward Island are deeply interested in the causeway," the Senator said, "and we intend to keep up the pressure for its construction."

"I know our members in the House of Commons are going to keep up the pressure to have it built."

Sable Ponies Are Fed Again

HALIFAX (CP)—Three-hundred hungry Sable Island ponies were given a two-ton meal of hay Friday by an RCAF Dakota aircraft from the search and rescue unit at Greenwood, N.S.

The air force dropped two tons of hay to the ponies Monday after the transport department said grass normally accessible to the wild herd had been covered by drifting sand.

An air force spokesman said the hay was dropped on the beach of the lonely island just above the tide mark. The treacherous sand island is about 100 miles southeast of Halifax.

TORONTO (CP)—Canadian motor-vehicle production this week is estimated at 9,270 vehicles compared with 9,369, last week, says the Canadian Automobile Chamber of Commerce.

Production consisted of 8,118 cars compared with 7,845 and 1,602 trucks compared with 1,524.
